



# **Regional Reports**



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Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun, Madison, Prince William, Rappahannock, and Stafford counties; the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park

Temperatures were about 2° F below average in April and May at both Dulles Int'l and Reagan Nat. Airports while rainfall was near to slightly below average for the period. The highlights this season included a White-winged Dove in *Rappahannock*, one of only a couple seen in the Piedmont and seen more typically in the fall statewide, an impressive flock of 22 Whimbrels in the Dyke Marsh area, a Little Gull at Belmont Bay Marina, and a Lark Sparrow in the *Stafford* Piedmont.

#### WATERFOWL-SHOREBIRDS

Four **Cackling Geese**, a fairly rare winter visitor in the Region, were seen at Daniels Run Pk., Fairfax City 1 Mar (MA, JF, NN). A **Blue-winged Teal** seen at Huntley Meadows 5 Mar (E&JJ) preceded the Regional early date of 15 Mar. A pair of **American Black Ducks** lingered at the Warrenton Res. 30 Apr (PSa), well past the Piedmont late date of 30 Mar. Single

**Long-tailed Ducks**, a rare transient inland, were observed at Burke L. Pk., Fairfax 14 Mar (ph. DL) and Belvoir Pond, Fauquier Mar 26 (GS). A **Redhead** observed at Belmont Bay Marina 29 Apr (KG) was well past the species' Coastal Plain late date of 15 Apr. Reports of Ring-necked Ducks observed past the species' Coastal Plain late date of 15 Apr included 4 at Occoquan Bay 9–10 May (PSi), with a single observed at the adjacent Belmont Bay Marina 14-24 May (KG). The Gold Book confirms that small numbers often linger through May. A probable **Greater Scaup** was reported at L. Brittle, *Fauguier* 13 Mar (GS). A **Bufflehead** lingered at the Warrenton Res. 7–14 May (MC, SL, PSa), well past the typical Regional late date of 10 Apr and even the Piedmont extreme late date of 27 Apr. Another was seen off Mason Neck 11 May (KG). There were several reports of 2–6 ads. (the latter, all f., on 28 April). Common Mergansers occurred from mid-April through mid-May in a localized area near Sperryville, Rappahannock, mainly on a small river, Thornton R. (ph. PL). This species is fairly rare in the Piedmont in spring away from reservoirs in the n. Piedmont, per the Gold Book. The fact that one pair was seen with 12 chicks on 3 May (RRa) explains this pair's presence past the usual Piedmont late date of 10 April (extreme late date 15 May). Four **Red-breasted Mergansers** were observed at Occoquan Bay 17 May (AH, RHi), past the species' Regional late date of 30 Apr, with additional reports of 1-2 birds lingering through May (as small numbers are apt to do, per the Gold Book). A single was observed at the Warrenton Res. (rare in the Piedmont) 23 May (SL, PSa). A Ruddy Duck seen at Occoquan Bay 30 May (ph. TH) was well past the species' Coastal Plain late date of 15 Apr; the Gold Book states the species is a rare but regular early summer visitor. A WHITE-WINGED DOVE, exceptionally rare for the Piedmont with only one record in the Gold Book outside our Region, was seen along Aaron Mt. Rd., Rappahannock 2 May (IT). Most of the few state records are in the outer Coastal Plain in the fall; however, eBird shows two additional spring records, one in our Region (in 2014 at Occoquan Bay). Interestingly, the subject bird may have lingered, as one showed up around 2 mi. away in the next report period (5 Jun). Distinct Yellow-billed Cuckoo calls were heard well before the Piedmont extreme early date of 30 Apr: from a residence in Countryside, Loudoun 6 Apr (BHi) and the following day at Bles Pk., about 2.5 mi. further up the Potomac R. (JB). It was an exceptional year for Black-billed Cuckoos, a rare transient in the Coastal Plain, especially in spring, with at least 10 sightings. An apparent Chuck-will's-widow, rare n. of the James R., was reported as heard calling at a residence at Great Falls, Fairfax 15 May (HS). Two King Rails, a rare transient in the Piedmont, were heard along Thoms Rd., Culpeper 12 May (TD), with at least one continuing through the period. Single Virginia Rails, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, were encountered along Crane Ln., Rappahannock 28-29 Apr (IT) and at Sky Meadows 4 May (BHa) and again 25 May. A Sora, also a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, was found dead in the gutter in a residential neighborhood in Fairfax City 7 May (JC), probably migrating north. There were several reports of Common Gallinules, a rare transient in the Region. An individual seen along Bedder Stone Pl., Prince William 18 Mar (anon.) was significantly before the 16 Apr extreme early date for the Piedmont. Other reports included 2 seen at Bles Pk. 25 Apr (GB, LF) continuing through 18 May (ph. m. obs.), and singles at Gravelly Pt. Pk., Arlington 27 Apr-1 May (EW); the National Recreation and Park Association lake, Loudoun 10 May (PN); and Occoquan Bay NWR 22 May (LC). The **Sandhill Cranes** that spent most of the winter at Algonkian RP and nearby areas continued into early spring, with 4 seen there 8 Mar (MMy) and 3 on 10 Mar (SK). An Upland Sandpiper, a rare transient in the Region, was seen among puddles along Hebron Church Rd., Madison 13 May (IT). A late **Dunlin**, a rare transient in the Piedmont with an extreme late date of 18 May, was found at the ponds/ wetlands along Wilderness Rd., Madison 22 May (IT). A White-rumped Sandpiper, also a rare spring transient in the Piedmont, was seen at a pond along Colvin Ln., Prince William 30 May (EP), where it continued through 1 Jun. An impressive 22 WHIMBRELS, rare w. of the Chesapeake Bay, were observed in flight at Dyke Marsh 23 May (JH); 20 were found along the shore at nearby Hunting Cr. Bridge later in the day (ph. KG).

## **GULLS-HERONS**

A Bonaparte's Gull seen off Hunting Cr. Bridge 18 May (KG) was considerably later than the species' Regional late date of 30 Apr. A LITTLE GULL, a species with only a handful of records in the state, was seen at Belmont Bay Marina 17 Apr (ph. LC, AJ). The period saw at least 10 reports, all widely scattered, of Caspian Terns in the Piedmont, where the species is a rare transient. A Black Tern, a rare spring transient in the inland Coastal Plain, was seen at Great Marsh in Mason Neck 11 May (ph. KG) and again 19 May. Also fairly rare this far inland were 10 Common Terns seen at Great Marsh in Mason Neck NWR 11 May (ph. KG) and singles at Dyke Marsh 12 May (RRi) and Leesylvania SP, Prince William 12 May (ph. RHe). A Forster's Tern, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, was seen at Mountain Run L. Pk. 14 Apr (KK). After a single bird showed up at Dyke Marsh 3 Mar (DSa), with 3 seen there and at nearby Hunting Cr. Bridge 6 May (KG, RRi). A large flock of American White Pelicans, a rare visitor in the Region, spent time farther south, with 38 first seen 12 Apr at Belmont Bay Marina (KG) and as many as 56 observed there and at nearby Occoquan Bay and Mason Neck SP, Fairfax for about a week (some wandered up the Occoquan R.); some of the flock hung around the rest of April, with 2 lingering into late May at Occoquan Bay (ph. m. obs.). Reports of American Bitterns, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, included one at Bles Pk. 14 Apr (ph. BHe), often joined by a second bird through 28 Apr (m. obs.), and singles at Sky Meadows 24 Apr (TD); a pond on Middlesex Dr., Loudoun 11 May (GG); and Cub Run Stream Valley Pk. 15 May (AN). A Least Bittern, a rare and local transient in the Piedmont, was an exciting find at Bles Pk. 14 May (ph. CL). A Great Egret seen at Government Is. Pk., Stafford 2 Mar (LB) was considerably before the species' 25 Mar Coastal Plain early date; the species is a rare winter resident away from the coast. Early Green Herons ahead of the 10 Apr Piedmont early date were seen at the Auburn Middle School wetlands, Fauquier 1 Apr (GS); the East Stratford pond off Hope Pkwy., Loudoun 1 Apr (MS); and about 6 mi. away at Forest Manor, Loudoun 2 Apr (BHi). There were four reports of Yellow-crowned Night-Herons, rare and local transients in the Piedmont: 2 at Leopold's Preserve, Prince William 23 Apr (KG) and singles at the Herndon Golf Course, Fairfax 1–7 May (WH); Bles Pk. 3–5 May (JB, ph. AGa); and Olde Izaak Walton Pk., Loudoun 3 May (ph. MMy). Glossy lbis, a rare spring transient in the Piedmont, made several widely separated appearances in Loudoun: 9 at Bles Pk. 23 Apr (GG), with a single later spending time there 16-22

May (ph., m. obs.); 4 along Weather Service Rd. 30 Apr (AGa, BHe); and a single at the Dulles Greenway Wetlands Mitigation Project 9 May (BHi).

#### **RAPTORS-KINGLETS**

A late Northern Harrier was seen near Ida Lee Pk., Loudoun 23 May (HA) and an apparent one at Waples Mill Meadow Pk., Fairfax, also 23 May (anon.). Also late were a Sharp-shinned Hawk seen at a residence at Taylorstown, Loudoun 22 May (GH) and an apparent one in the Pinecrest neighborhood, Fairfax 27 May (BHo). The Piedmont late date for both of these species is 30 Apr, and they are rare summer visitors. Mississippi Kites were reported returning to established and new locations in May, continuing the trend of recent years. A rare transient in the Piedmont was a Merlin seen along Meetze Rd., Fauquier 2 May (GS, SSI). A very early Eastern Kingbird was reported as seen by a group of four birders in clear scope views, perched and hawking insects from the top of a bare tree, at Meadowood Recreation Area, Fairfax 11 Mar (JH, anon.) (Regional early date 20 Apr). Olive-sided Flycatchers, a rare transient in the Region, especially in spring, were seen at Rock Hill District Pk., Fairfax 15 May (SJ); Sully Historic Site, Fairfax 21 May (SJ); Cub Run Stream Valley Pk. 23 May (QE); Algonkian RP 25 May (AR); Great Falls Pk., Fairfax 25 May (ph. JSto); and L. Fairfax. Pk., Fairfax 27 May (JMe). Also a rare transient in the Region, Yellow-bellied Flycatchers were seen at Sully Woodlands, Fairfax 4 May (SJ) (the Piedmont early date is 10 May); Huntley Meadows 26 May (KG); and along Frytown Rd., Fauquier 30 May (GS). There were numerous reports of Alder Flycatchers, a rare transient in spring in the Region, including singles at Algonkian RP 20-25 May (AR, ph. m. obs.); Frying Pan Farm Pk. 20 May (KG); and a residence in Great Falls, Fairfax 21 May (ph. AN); 4 at Bristoe Station 23 May and 5 the next day (ph. KG); 2 at Julie Metz Wetland 24 May (KG) and again 25 May; one at Poplar Ford Pk., Fairfax 25 May (KS, RMo) and 2 there the next day; 2 at Huntley Meadows 26 May (KG); and one at Woodgrove HS, Loudoun 31 May (JY). A Least Flycatcher, a rare spring transient in the Piedmont, was reported on the Holmes Run II Trail, Alexandria 18 May (LU). An early White-eyed Vireo seen at Sky Meadows 31 Mar (DB) preceded the Piedmont extreme early date of 5 Apr. A Blue-headed Vireo seen at Long Branch Nature Center 4 Mar (ph. TN) was significantly earlier than the species' Regional early date of 10 Apr. A Brown-headed **Nuthatch**, rare in the Region since the winter stays of the

Mountain Run L. Pk. bird seem to have ceased, was reported as distinctly heard at C.M. Crockett Pk., *Fauquier* 20 Mar (DL, GS, SSI). Seen well before the 10 Apr Regional early date were **House Wrens** at Riverbend Pk., *Fairfax* 1 Mar (SB) and Aquia Landing 22 Mar (AGr, EG); the species is a rare winter visitor. A **Sedge Wren**, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was seen at Frying Pan Farm Pk. 2–3 May (ph. AN, m. obs.). A **Ruby-crowned Kinglet** was reported at G.R. Thompson WMA, *Fauquier* 22 May (WM, RMo, ES), past the species' Piedmont extreme late date of 16 May.

#### MIMIDS-DICKCISSEL

A Gray Catbird seen at Banshee Reeks Nature Preserve, Loudoun 17 Mar (MMe) was far earlier than the Piedmont early date of 25 Apr; the species is a rare but regular winter visitor. Two Purple Finches were observed at a residence in Burke, Fairfax 13 May (DP), with both, then one, seen again 20-22 May, outlasting the species' 11 May Piedmont extreme late date. A Grasshopper Sparrow, seen in a gravel lot at Dulles Int. Airport, Fairfax 6 Apr (ph. JE), preceded the 20 Apr Piedmont early date. A Lark Sparrow, a very rare visitor and apparently just the seventh record in the Region, was well-seen at L. Mooney Pk., Stafford 5 May (ph. JeP, JoP). A **Seaside Sparrow** was seen at Aquia Landing 6 May (ph. JStr). While the species is a rare late-summer dispersant in the inland Coastal Plain, this is just the second known spring sighting in the Region. Five Savannah Sparrows were observed well past the 10 May Piedmont late date along Grassdale Rd., Fauquier 31 May (DSo), a repeat breeding site that is further s. than the extreme n. part of the Piedmont where the species is known to be a rare breeder. There were several reports of Lincoln's Sparrows in the period—a fairly rare but increasing spring transient in the Region. A Yellowheaded Blackbird, a rare visitor in the Region, was first seen at Dyke Marsh 22 Mar (CE, JMa), where it continued through 5 Apr (ph. m. obs.). Two Bobolinks, rarely found inside the Capital Beltway, were seen at Americana Pk., Fairfax 6 May (SE); there was an uncommon sighting of 30+ the same day farther w. at Frying Pan Farm Pk. (HW), with 15 still there 12 May. Perhaps a wandering over-wintering bird, a **Baltimore** Oriole was seen at a residence in Prince William 3-8 Mar (D&KB). There were numerous reports of Golden-winged Warblers, a species with increasing rarity away from the n. Blue Ridge: a m. at Huntley Meadows 3-5 May (ph. BJ, EK) and a f. there 4-5 May (QE, KG, ph. WK); a m. at Upton Hill RP, Arlington 5-6 May (MG); a m. at Cub Run Stream Valley Pk. 5–10 May (NA, SSi); a m. at Occoquan Bay 6 May (ph. JStr); a m. at White Oaks Pk., Fairfax 4-7 May (ph. BJ); and a m. at Leesylvania SP, *Prince William* 8–10 May (LC, AJ). A singing m. **Brewster's Warbler**, a recognized Golden-winged × Blue-winged hybrid, was seen at Huntley Meadows 7–13 May (ph. SF, m. obs.), very soon after the m. and f. Golden-winged Warblers were seen there.

Late Blue-winged Warblers were seen at Accotink Bay Wildlife Refuge, Fairfax 17 May (HM) and Fred Crabtree Pk., Fairfax 23 May (MMay); 10 May is the Coastal Plain and Piedmont late date for this fairly rare transient in the e. part of the Region. An early Tennessee Warbler was observed at Conway-Robinson SF, Prince William 22-25 Apr (ph. SK), preceding the typical slim Piedmont migration range of 2-20 May. Three of the species, which is a fairly rare spring transient in both the Piedmont and Coastal Plain, were observed at Monticello Pk. 21 May (ph. TK). An Orangecrowned Warbler, a rare transient in the Region, was seen at Frying Pan Farm Pk. 4 May (CS, PSc) and again 9 May (ph. AN). A Nashville Warbler, a late and fairly rare transient in the Coastal Plain, was observed at Huntley Meadows 23 May (LS), where the late date is 15 May. A rare transient in the Region, especially in spring, 2 Mourning Warblers were observed along Possum Pt. Rd., Prince William 10 May (SF, KG, PK). Singles were observed at Bristoe Station 24 May (DL, ph. EM); Huntley Meadows 24 May (BJ); Angry Moose Lodge HQ, Fairfax 26 May (RS); and Julie Metz Wetland 26 May (MMai, RMa). A Common Yellowthroat showed up early at Aquia Landing 22 Mar (AGr, EG); the Coastal Plain early date is 10 Apr; the species is a fairly rare winter resident. There was an impressive showing of 10 Cape May Warblers past the Coastal Plain late date of 15 May at Monticello Pk. 21 May (TA, ph. TK); one lingered as late as 25 May. An early Chestnut-sided Warbler was seen at Huntley Meadows 19 Apr (MMc); the Coastal Plain extreme early date is 28 Apr. Single Yellow-throated Warblers, rare and local in the Piedmont north of Albemarle and Louisa, were seen at Phelps WMA, Fauquier 8 Apr, 28 Apr, & 3 May (TD, IT). An early Black-throated Green Warbler seen at a residence in Clifton, Fairfax 5 Apr (EK) preceded the Piedmont early date of 20 Apr. Seen just prior to the 2 May Piedmont extreme early date was a Canada Warbler seen at the Warrenton Res. 30 Apr (PSa). Also early were a f. Rosebreasted Grosbeak that appeared at a residence in Reston, Fairfax 1 Apr (OL) (Piedmont extreme early date 2 Apr) and a Blue Grosbeak observed at Mountain Run L. Pk. 12 Apr (GJ) (Piedmont extreme early date 21 Apr). A Dickcissel that had been a rare winter resident at the Julie Metz Wetland in January and February was seen again 11 Mar (JA). Dickcissels also returned again this season to Bristoe Station, where they likely have been breeding since 2017; one was observed 25 May (JR-C) and continued through the end of the period.

#### WATERFOWL-SHOREBIRDS

Single **Snow Geese** were found in *Augusta* 4 Mar (EC), in Waynesboro 27 Mar (MN), and in Luray, Page 6 Mar (CK) and 18 Apr (DH). Greater White-fronted Goose sightings included 2 in Bridgewater, Rockingham 5 Mar (MS); 2 at L. Campbell, Rockingham 7 Mar (GMo); and one in Dublin, *Pulaski* 9–20 Mar (m. obs.). A Cackling **Goose** was seen at Lakeside L., *Frederick* 2 Mar (WP) and one was at Broadway 21 Mar (DH). The Trumpeter Swan with wing tag P61 was seen 1–11 Mar in Waynesboro (m. obs.). A **Tundra Swan** was at Willow L., *Rockbridge* 8–21 Mar (m. obs.). A **Surf Scoter** pair was observed and photographed at L. Arrowhead, Page 18 Apr (JF, DH, SS). Long-tailed Duck reports included 3 at L. Holiday, Frederick 13 Mar (GR); one in Staunton 25 Mar (AL); 2 in Stuarts Draft, Augusta 25 Mar (VL); one at L. Arrowhead, Page 26 Mar (MS, SS) then 15 there 28 Mar (AS, SS); and 2-3 at L. Frederick, Frederick 22-30 Mar (m. obs.). A **Red-necked Grebe** was found at Willow L., *Rockbridge* 18–19 Apr (m. obs.). A WHITE-WINGED DOVE was photographed in Augusta 20 Apr (MGo). The ANNA'S **HUMMINGBIRD** that spent the winter at L. Frederick, Frederick was last recorded 2 Mar (ph. CM). A King Rail was seen and photographed at Greenfield, *Botetourt* 28–29 May (m. obs.). **Virginia Rail** finds included 3 at Bent Mt. Center, Roanoke 27 Mar (MB) then 2 there 29 Mar (AD, SL); one to 2 in Blacksburg 24 Apr through 10 May (m. obs.); and 5 at Gala Wetlands, Botetourt 15 May (GB). **Sora** reports included 3 in *Augusta* 25 Apr (JF, GR); one in Blacksburg 24 (RM) & 25 Apr (PL) and 1-2 May (m. obs.); one in Warren 1 May (JF); 4 at Gala Wetlands, Botetourt 3 May (BK); one in Frederick 7–8 May (GR);

3 in Rockingham 11 May (MG); and one in Rockbridge 16 May (LN). Single **Common Gallinules** were found at Abrams Cr. Wetlands, Frederick 5 (DC, DG) to 8 May (DG, EG, GR); L. Frederick, Frederick 13 May (MY); in Page 21 May (FF, JF, DH); and at Greenfield L., Botetourt 22–24 May (m. obs.). A **Sandhill Crane** was found at Smith L., Augusta 6 Apr (GM) and one was in Rockingham 23 May (MG). A Black-bellied Plover was in Rockingham 28 (MG) & 29 Apr (DH); another was in Shenandoah 11 (JF) & 12 May (JF, DH) and one was at the Roanoke STP 20 May (AD, KD). An American Golden-Plover was seen and photographed in Dublin, *Pulaski* 17 May (MM et al.). **Semipalmated Plover** totals of note were 12–14 at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 11 (MG) to 13 May (CTZ) and 28 in Shenandoah 12 May (DH). An Upland Sandpiper was found in Rockingham 18 Apr (fide DL). A RUDDY **TURNSTONE** was photographed at the Roanoke STP 21 May (NR) and a **Sanderling** was in *Rockingham* 16 (IL, WL) to 18 May (MG). Least Sandpiper high counts were 40 at Leonard's Pond, Rockingham (MG); 36 at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham (MG) and 18 at Broadway 11 May (MG); and 16 at the Roanoke STP 21 May (NR). A total of 5 White-rumped Sandpipers were found in two Augusta locations 21 May (AL, GM); one was in the county 22 May (EC). Pectoral Sandpiper peak counts included 5 in Swoope, Augusta 15 Apr (JL, VL) and 12 in Dublin, Pulaski 19 Apr (MM). Highest Semipalmated Sandpiper tallies were 6 at Leonard's Pond, Rockingham 13 May (DH); 6 at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 17 May (PN); 8 in Augusta (GM); 23 at the Roanoke STP 21 May (NR); and 9 in Dublin, *Pulaski* (MM) and 6 in *Shenandoah* 22 May (DH). A Western Sandpiper was seen at Smith L., Augusta 20 May (GM). Three Short-billed Dowitchers were observed at Smith L., Augusta 23 Apr (AL). Two **LONG-BILLED DOWITCHERS** were found at Mt. Solon, Augusta 24 Apr (AL, GM, PW); one in Shenandoah 24 Apr (DH); 18 in Dublin, Pulaski 24 Apr (m. obs.) with

2 still there 26 Apr (MM). A WILSON'S PHALAROPE was seen at Mt. Solon, Augusta 23-24 Apr (m. obs.). Numerous **RED-NECKED PHALAROPES** were noted in the Region mid- to late May as follows: one at Leonard's Pond, Rockingham 17 May (m. obs.) then 4 there 28 May (VB); 7 at Broadway 21 May (MG, DH) followed by 9 there the next day (JF, DH) and 3 on 28 May (DH); one at Greenfield, Botetourt 23 & 24 May (m. obs.); and one in Blacksburg 31 May (m. obs.). A remarkable weatherrelated fallout of **WILLETS** (all *inornata* based on photos) deposited one in Dublin, Pulaski 26 (SK) & 27 Apr (LA, ph. MM, GR, ph. JW); 6 in Blacksburg 26 Apr (ph. JG, ph. PL, DW, HW); one (subspecies undetermined) at Cross Junction, Frederick 28 Apr (GR); one in Rockingham 6 (ph. MG) to 8 May (DH); and 16 at Carvins Cove, Botetourt 6 May (ph. MB, KD, ph. AD).

#### **GULLS-TANAGERS**

Bonaparte's Gull sightings accounted for 60 at Claytor L., *Pulaski* 22 Mar (PL); 42 at Broadway 31 Mar (MG); 82 at L. Frederick, *Frederick* 31 Mar (DBZ, WP); and the following at L. Holiday, *Frederick*: 62 on 28 Mar, 210 on 31 Mar, and 73 on 5 Apr (GR). A Caspian Tern was seen at L. Frederick, *Frederick* 18 Apr (DB). Elsewhere, 5 were at Smith L., *Augusta* 18 Apr (m. obs.); 3 at Sunset View L., *Augusta* 20 Apr (AL); and one at Broadway 22 Apr (EO). A Black Tern was seen in Harrisonburg 9 (MG) & 10 May (GMo); singles were at Claytor L., *Pulaski* (MM) and L. Frederick, *Frederick* 22 May (m. obs.). Four Forster's Terns were observed at Claytor L., *Pulaski* 5 Apr (LS). Additional observations had one at Silver L., *Rockingham* 5 (DR), 24 (MG), & 27 Apr (GMo); one at L. Arrowhead, *Page* 18 Apr

(SS); 2 at L. Holiday, Frederick 18 Apr to 3 May (GR); 2 at Broadway (CT); one at the Roanoke STP (JD, KD) and one in Staunton 30 Apr (MK, GM, PW); 2 at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 6 May (MSt); and 3 at Claytor L., Pulaski 7 May (MM). Single American Bitterns were found near Stuarts Draft, Augusta 28 Mar (GM) then 12 (IL) & 24 Apr (GM); at Braley Pond, Augusta 5 Apr (RS); in Botetourt 18 Apr (DHi) and 8 May (BK); at the Starkey Wetland, Roanoke 27-30 Apr (m. obs.); in Blacksburg 28 Apr (SL); and at the Abrams Cr. Wetlands Preserve, Frederick 8 May (DB, WP). A **Least Bittern** was observed at L. Arrowhead, Page 12-15 May (m. obs.) and one was in Augusta 16 May (AL, GM). A **SNOWY EGRET** was seen in *Rockingham* 24 May (m. obs.). A GLOSSY IBIS was observed and photographed in Shenandoah 8-9 May (JF, RW) and one was in Augusta 22 May (m. obs.). A Mississippi Kite was seen at Claytor L., Pulaski 25 May (MM). A dark morph Rough-legged Hawk recorded on Sapling Ridge, Highland 10 May (LH, JSp) was 2 days beyond this species' Gold Book Mountains and Valleys 8 May extreme late date. The Long-eared Owl that wintered at Blandy was observed through 9 Mar (m. obs.). Four Short-eared Owls were seen in Staunton until 8 Mar (m. obs.). Single Olivesided Flycatchers were observed near Swoope, Augusta 16 May (AL); at Cowbane Prairie NAP, Augusta (GM) and in George Washington NF, Shenandoah 23 May (JF); in Jefferson NF, Montgomery (BS) 24 & 25 May (SK); and near Blacksburg 24 May (HW). One each Yellow-bellied Flycatchers were at Third Winchester Battlefield, Frederick 17 May (JF); L. Frederick, Frederick 26 May (DB, WP); and in Shenandoah NP, Page 30 May (SR). Virginia's second fully documented BELL'S VIREO was at the Virginia Tech Vet School Pond, Blacksburg 28 (ph. DW et al.) & 29 Apr (ph. & v. r. m. obs.). Coincidentally, another was posted to

eBird 29 Apr at Love's Pt., Queen Anne's, MD. The first and only other VARCOM Category 1 Bell's Vireo was one banded on Fisherman Island NWR 19 Sep 2010. The Gold Book lists one Category 2 sight record at Pocahontas SP, Chesterfield 12 Aug 1962. Twenty-five Horned Larks were in Rockingham 26 Apr (WL). Brown-headed Nuthatch sightings included 2 in Dublin, Pulaski 20 Mar (LD); 2 in Montgomery 28 Mar (m. obs.); 6 at Whispering Pines Pk., Roanoke 16 May (LC, SL); and 5 at Carvins Cove, Botetourt 25 May (LC). A **Sedge Wren** was found in Blacksburg 17 Apr (RM). Subsequently, singles were found at Caldwell Fields, Montgomery 29 Apr (m. obs.); in Blacksburg 10 (m. obs.) & 16 May (RM); and at Whitethorne, Montgomery 10 May (LA). A Marsh Wren was at Blandy 4–30 Mar (m. obs.). Others reported were one in Augusta 23 Apr (GM); one to 2 in Blacksburg 17 Apr to 2 May (m. obs.); and one at Roundhill Marsh, Frederick 2 May (JF, GR). The highest Red Crossbill counts were from Briery Branch Gap, Rockingham with 14 on 8 Mar (KH) and 24 on 24 May (JS). Additional reports in the Region included 2 near Blacksburg 28 Mar, 11 & 27 Apr, and 10 May (m. obs.); 4 in *Augusta* 4 Apr (GM); 2 on Little Walker Mt., *Pulaski* 22 Apr (SB); 2 in *Augusta* 29 Apr (GM); 2 in Poverty Hollow, *Montgomery* 28 May (RM); and 12 at Locust Springs, *Highland* 29 May (MN, NR). A frequently listed **Lark Sparrow** was at Blandy 3–29 Mar (m. obs.). High **Golden-winged Warbler** counts included 5 in Giles 3 May (JG, HW); 7 there 16 May (JW); and 4 in Blue Grass Valley, Highland 28 May (MN, NR). Two **Swainson's Warblers** were found in *Rockingham* 20 May (VB). The **SCOTT'S ORIOLE** that wintered at a private residence near Swoope, *Augusta* continued to least 23 Mar (ph. m. obs.). Birders were alerted to *Augusta's* third **WESTERN TANAGER** 18 Apr (*fide* JSp). This one was a m. that had been present for six weeks off Stingy Hollow Rd.; it was documented by m. obs. through 7 May.

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Bland, Buchanan, Carroll, Dickenson, Floyd, Grayson, Lee, Russell, Scott, Smyth, Tazewell, Washington, Wise, and Wythe counties; the cities/towns of Abingdon, Bristol, Galax, Norton, and Tazewell

After a fairly dry start to the spring, the rain really picked up in May, which seemed to result in migrants lingering a bit longer than usual in many cases. The most interesting record for the Region that might be related to that phenomenon was a Lapland Longspur in *Buchanan* for an entire week. It was a good spring for passerine migrants as well, with several species seen that are typically only found in the fall, if they are recorded at all.

#### **QUAIL-OWLS**

As has often been the case in recent years, the only reports of Northern Bobwhite came from Southern Gap, Buchanan where up to 2 were recorded throughout May (m. obs.). Most Eurasian Collared-Dove reports this spring came from the usual spots in Lee. More notable were 2 on Rocky Hollow Rd., Grayson 27 Mar (ph. AB), a first county record, and 5 at Ivanhoe, Wythe 19 May (ph. MA, EC). Up to 3 Virginia Rails were at Saltville, *Smyth* throughout the period; another bird was noted at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 4 & 28 Apr (ph. DS). Single Sora were at Saltville, Smyth 25 Apr (ph. CD) and at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 10 May (DS). Semipalmated Plovers were at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 6 & 14 May (ph. DS). It was a good spring for **Semipalmated Sandpipers**, with one at Washington County Pk., Washington 27 Apr (MS); 2 at Saltville, Smyth 18 May (ph. MA, m. obs.); one at Kinder Valley Rd., Wythe 18 May (ph. MA); and up to 12 in Burke's Garden, Tazewell 14 & 19 May (ph. DS). Bonaparte's Gulls were recorded at more locations than usual this spring, with one at Saltville, Smyth 21 May (DS); 6 at Britt's Park, *Tazewell* 1 Apr (ph. CD); one at The Cove, Tazewell 15-18 Apr (ph. CD); and one at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 14–16 Apr (ph. AB, VF). A Forster's Tern was at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 28 Apr (ph. AB). Three Common **Terns** were at the same location 9 May (FA). An **American** Bittern was at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 4 Apr (ph. AB). A dead one that appeared to have been hit by a car was also found in Burke's Garden, Tazewell 17 May (MA). A Black**crowned Night-Heron** was at a farm pond on Barberry Dr., *Lee* 28 Apr (ph. TS, LG). The only **Yellow-crowned Night-Heron** report came from Bristol as usual, with one at Beaver Cr. 6 May (ph. TD). **Golden Eagles** were at Breaks Interstate Pk., *Dickenson* 9 Mar (DR) and Whitetop Mt., *Grayson* 27 Mar (CD). A **Northern Saw-whet Owl** was at Whitetop Mt., *Grayson* 18 Mar (CD).

#### **FLYCATCHERS-DICKCISSEL**

An Alder Flycatcher at Southern Gap, Buchanan 31 May (v.r. GB) may have been either a late migrant or a potential breeder. The only Loggerhead Shrike reports were one at Elk Garden, Russell 9 Apr (ph. CD) and one on Browning Rd., Washington 29 Apr (ph. TS). A Philadelphia Vireo in Burke's Garden, Tazewell 10 May (DS) was an unexpected spring migrant, but it seems this was a better spring than normal for this species throughout the state. Brownheaded Nuthatches continued throughout the period at Washington County Pk., Washington (m. obs.). A Marsh Wren was at the Riverstone Organic Farm, Floyd 3 May (SC). Not surprisingly after the species' poor showing this winter, it was a poor spring for Purple Finches in the Region, with just two reports: 2 at Whitetop Mt., Grayson 8 Mar (LA) and one at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 12 Apr (DS). **Pine Siskin** records were limited and mostly restricted to the Whitetop/Mt. Rogers area. The latest report was of 3 birds along the AT near Elk Garden, Smyth 18 May (ph. MA, EC). The only report away from this area was a lone bird at Compton Mt., Buchanan 5 May (RM). Red Crossbills were on Whitetop Mt., Grayson throughout March (m. obs.), and there was also a single bird present there along with 5 birds at Mt. Rogers on 14 May (DS). More unexpected was a single bird at Compton Mt., Buchanan 5 May (ph. RM), providing the first documented record for Buchanan. One of the most surprising finds of the season was a m. Lapland **Longspur** in almost full breeding plumage at Southern Gap, Buchanan 3 & 9 May (ph. C&VR, DO, MS).

The only **Golden-winged Warblers** this spring were in *Tazewell*, with birds at two different locations near The Cove

23 May (DO, MS) and one photographed at Cavitt's Creek Pk. 24 May. There are very few spring **Orange-crowned Warbler** reports for this Region, so a well-photographed bird at Rural Retreat L., *Wythe* 14 Apr (ph. AB) was a very nice find. Another one was at Breaks Interstate Pk., *Dickenson* 19 April (DO). A **Wilson's Warbler** was at Riverstone Organic Farm, *Floyd* 27 May (ph. SC). An impressive count of 8 **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** was recorded at Compton Mt., *Buchanan* 3 May (ph. RM). Surprisingly, the only **Dickcissel** reported was one on Waddletown Rd., *Bland* 13 & 17 May (ph. NN, v.r. MA, EC).

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Amelia, Appomattox, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Dinwiddie, Franklin, Greensville, Halifax, Henry, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway, Patrick, Pittsylvania, and Prince Edward counties; the cities/towns of Colonial Heights, Danville, Emporia, Martinsville, Petersburg, and South Boston

The spring weather was largely pleasant and some noteworthy birds were found, though the emergence of COVID-19 clearly slowed birder activity in this Region as well as across the nation. Late in the season, work on the final year of the second Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas began, providing several noteworthy reports. Since waterfowl numbers were low during the preceding winter, it's not surprising that counts of species in that group were generally low this season as well. On the other hand, several new county shorebird records were established in counties with minimal shorebird habitat.

# **WATERFOWL**

The only Blue-winged Teal report away from Dick Cross, where several were seen on various dates, was a single bird at Briery Cr. L., Prince Edward, 14 Apr (AJ, TJ, MS). **Northern Shovelers** were only reported from Dick Cross in March, the latest record being 3 m. there 29 Mar (PG), after the species was not reported in the Region at all the previous winter. The only American Black Ducks reported were 3 at a private lake in c. Buckingham, 21 Mar, (DS), and 3 at Dick Cross 22 Mar (AD, PG). The only Redhead was one on lower Kerr 1 Mar (PG). Some Greater Scaup were on lower Kerr in March, but away from there the only report was a pair at SRR 24 Mar (ES). A remarkable 7 Long-tailed Ducks were on lower Kerr 22 Mar (ph. AD, PG); the species was unreported elsewhere and is generally unexpected in the Region. A single m. Common Merganser along the Riverwalk Tr., Danville, 16 Mar (ph. DP) was the only report.

#### **RAILS-LOONS**

Two Virginia Rails were calling at Dick Cross 23 Apr (NN), with one there on subsequent days through 25 Apr (m.obs.); the species is seldom reported in the Region despite probably being a regular migrant. The same might be said for **Sora**, which were reported at Dick Cross 19 Apr (1 bird, PG) through 10 May (AD, PG), with a high count of 6 on 23 Apr (NN). The high count of American Coots was only 8 at Dick Cross 29 Mar (PG), with no reports from anywhere other than lower Kerr and Dick Cross. Migrant shorebirds of note included 27 Semipalmated Plovers in a flooded field along River Rd. in s. Cumberland 22 May (ES), probable firsts for the county, followed by 6 there 24 May (ES). Two **Ruddy Turnstones** at Staunton View Public Use Area, Mecklenburg 16 May (PG) were the only report. A flock of 12 **Dunlin** present at the same s. Cumberland site where the Semipalmated Plovers were seen 22 May (ES) were probably the first Cumberland record, while Prince Edward's first Dunlin appeared 30 Apr (ph. TS, ph. ES, ph. MS) on a farm pond in the w. part of the county. Also in the flooded field in s. Cumberland on 22 May (ES) were 2 Least Sandpipers and 6 Semipalmated Sandpipers, remarkable records for this location, with the Semipalmated Sandpipers apparent first county records. An ad. Laughing Gull was at Staunton View Public Use Area, Mecklenburg 17 May (ph. AD, PG); while the species is not expected there, it's not unprecedented around Kerr. Less expected were 4 seen briefly at SRR 28 May (ph. MS), providing a high count for *Prince Edward* as well as the first spring record there. The 28 May birds might have been influenced by the movement of the remains of Tropical Storm Bertha, which were passing w. of the Region at the time of the sighting. The only **Forster's** Tern reports were single birds at SRR 18 Apr (TS, ES) and lower Kerr 19 Apr (AD, PG), and 3 at SRR 27 Apr (TS). A continuing **Red-throated Loon** with an injured wing was present until at least 17 May (AD, PG) on lower Kerr and was the only individual reported.

#### ANHINGA-HERONS

An Anhinga at Taylors Millpond, *Greensville*, 16 May (TS, ES) was the only report. A single American Bittern was at Dick Cross 23 Apr (DP) through 25 Apr (PG), and another at Appomattox Riverside Pk., *Dinwiddie*, 8 Apr (TS, ES). A Snowy Egret 22 May (ph. ES) in a flooded field in s. *Cumberland* (see also Semipalmated Plover et al., above) was the only report and the first in several years for that county, while a Little Blue Heron, also along River Rd., *Cumberland*, 30 Apr, was perhaps a first county record and all the more remarkable for being an a. individual. Two Black-crowned Night-Herons at Wilcks Lk., *Prince Edward* 22 May (ph. WR), were the only night-herons reported.

#### VIREOS-DICKCISSEL

The earliest **Blue-headed Vireo** report was one singing 13 Mar at James R. SP, *Buckingham* (AL); there were two other March reports as well as numerous April sightings, a reasonably good showing for the species. A **Sedge Wren** was at the Petersburg National Battlefield Pk., *Dinwiddie* 2 May (ph. AD). Two **Marsh Wrens** were singing at Dick Cross 23 Apr (NN) and one remained through at least 3 May (AD, PG); the species is never common Regionally and these were the only reports this season.

The only **American Pipit** report was a single bird seen on plowed ground at a farm in w. *Prince Edward* 30 Apr (TS, ES, MS). Only single **Purple Finches** were reported, following the species' near-absence during the winter, with individual birds at feeders in South Boston, *Halifax* 4 Mar (JB) and 15 Mar (PG) and on Dry Fork Rd., *Pittsylvania* 

18-19 Mar (MF), while the only Pine Siskin was also a bird visiting a feeder in South Boston from the beginning of the season through 20 Apr (JB). The only Blue-winged Warblers were single birds 26 Apr at Banister R. WMA, Halifax (HG, PG), and in Farmville, Prince Edward 30 Apr (ph. JD), while **Swainson's Warblers** were only found in se. Greensville near the North Carolina border, where single birds were noted 30 (JF, JS) & 31 (KG) May. The 3 Wilson's Warblers seen 10 May at Dick Cross (AD, PG) were an amazing total given that even single birds are rarely found in the spring in this Region; the only other individual this season was one along the Berry Hill Plantation Tr., Halifax 14 May (HG, PG). Finally, **Dickcissels** were reported from three counties (Cumberland, Halifax, and Prince Edward), perhaps presaging a good number of this species attempting to breed in the Region.

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Albemarle, Amherst, Bedford, Campbell, Caroline, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Hanover, Louisa, Nelson, Orange, Powhatan, and Spotsylvania counties; the cities of Bedford, Charlottesville, Fredericksburg, and Lynchburg

With nearly 240 species reported in total, this spring was one for the books. Strong southwesterly winds brought early records of quite a few species, while several rare feeder visitors brought joy to cabin-fevered birders during the COVID-19 lockdown. April and May had several major rainfall events, causing impressive fallouts of waterbirds. Shorebirds stole the show for many birders this spring, with a total of a truly remarkable 20 species. Highlights were innumerable, but standout rarities included Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Upland Sandpiper, White-rumped Sandpiper, both Shortbilled and Long-billed Dowitchers, Wilson's and Red-necked Phalaropes, Willet, Black and Common Terns, Anhinga, Swallow-tailed Kite, Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, Sedge Wren, Evening Grosbeak, Swainson's Warbler, and Western Tanager.

#### **WATERFOWL-CRANES**

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Regional record, a **BLACK-BELLIED WHISTLING-DUCK** delighted area birders at the Fredericksburg Canal Path, Fredericksburg 30 & 31 May (BL, ph. m. obs.). Two Trumpeter Swans were at Clarks Mt. Rd., Orange 7 Mar (ph. TD, IT). Five **Long-tailed Ducks** dropped into Lickinghole Cr. Res., Albemarle 25 Mar (ph. AC). Two more were at L. Monticello, Fluvanna 18 Apr (ph. ST). A Common Merganser hen with 13 ducklings on the Rivanna R. at Pen Pk., Charlottesville 12 May (ph. BB TB CF) provided a notable breeding record away from the western James R. There were several Virginia Rails, with one recorded calling during nocturnal migration at Rugby Ave., Charlottesville 7 Apr (a.r. CF). Others were at Robert W. Duncan WMA, Caroline 17 Apr (AR); up to 3 at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 23 Apr through 6 May (ph. BB, TB, MN, JP, m. obs.); and one at Terry's Run Rd. 28 Apr (AR). Soras were not as widespread, with one at Warren Ferry, Albemarle 5-12 Apr (ph. BB, m. obs) and up to 3 at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle

23 Apr through 15 May (BB, TB, JP, MN, m. obs.). Not quite annual in spring in the Region, a **Common Gallinule** was observed at Fluvanna Ruritan L., *Fluvanna* 30 May (ph. DV). **Sandhill Cranes** showed up at several sites including one at Green Springs, *Louisa* 1 Mar (GG); another at a small wetland by Charlottesville Albemarle Airport, *Albemarle* 26 & 27 Apr (ph. GB, SB, m. obs.); 2 flying over Entwood, *Hanover* 4 May (NC); and possibly the same continuing bird at Green Springs, *Louisa* 30 May (ph. AB).

#### SHOREBIRDS-TERNS

Three **Black-bellied Plovers** were found at Groome's Pt., *Orange* 21 May (ph. AR, IT) and another was seen flying over Pleasant Landing Marina, *Louisa* 22 May (AR). Likely not reported in the Region in over a decade, 2 **Upland Sandpipers** were enjoyed by many at Greenfield Farm, *Albemarle* 26 Apr (ph. MN, m. obs.). **Dunlin** were detected in unusually high numbers during a fallout across the Region,

with peak counts of 6 at Wingina, Nelson 21 May (ph. ES, TS); 5 at Central Plains Pond, Fluvanna 21 May (ph. ST); 3 at Braeburn Pond, Albemarle 22 May (MJ, ph. BB, TB); and 3 at Groomes Pt., Orange 21 May (ph. AR, IT). There were numerous other reports of singles from Albemarle, Campbell, Fluvanna, Lynchburg, Nelson, and Orange. The sole report of White-rumped Sandpiper was one at Central Plains Pond, Fluvanna among other fallout shorebirds 21 May (ph. ST). There were two **Short-billed Dowitcher** reports from May 21, one from Groome's Pt., Orange (ph. AR, IT) and 2 from Wingina, Nelson (ph. ES, TS). Very rare in in the Region with less than five records, there were two LONG-BILLED **DOWITCHER** reports, both from 24 Apr: 2 at Groome's Pt., Orange (AR) and another at Liberty Corner Farm, Albemarle (ph. BB, WC, m. obs). The fact that both dowitcher species observations came in pairs from the same dates suggested a related fallout event for each.

Very rare in the Region and especially in spring migration, 2 WILSON'S PHALAROPES were found at Penicks Mill, Bedford 24 & 25 Apr (ph. BE, m. obs.). Several RED-NECKED PHALAROPES were detected due to the offshore passage of Tropical Storm Arthur, 2 and then 6 at MCLP 20 & 21 May (ph. MJ, MB, m. obs) and another at Green Springs, Louisa 22 May (ph. AR). Braeburn Pond, Albemarle proved to be a WILLET (all subspecies inornata) hotspot, with one there 26 Apr (ph. BB, m. obs), then a mind-boggling 44 there 30 Apr (ph. PM, m. obs) for one of the strangest and most impressive spectacles of the period. Three Black Terns briefly stopped by Braeburn Pond, Albemarle 21 May (ph. PM, m. obs.) during a weather system and another was at MCLP 22 May (JC). Three Common Terns were found at

Smith Mt. L, *Bedford* 21 May (ph. LA, GB) and 3 were at Reusen's Dam, *Bedford* 22 May (ph. LA).

#### ANHINGA-FLYCATCHERS

An **Anhinga** was spotted soaring over Bird Dog Mine, Caroline 23 May (v.r. EO). Up to 3 American Bitterns were found at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 23-29 Apr (ph. BB, TB, JP, MN, m. obs.); another was recorded during nocturnal migration at Emerson Commons, Albemarle 29 Apr (a.r. MS). At least 2 Least Bitterns were found at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 29 Apr through 27 May (BB, ph. TB, CF, MN, DS). A rare visitor to the Region, a Cattle **Egret** was found at Independence Rd., *Hanover* 14 Apr (ph. NC). Two Black-crowned Night-Herons were spotted, one at MCLP 17 Apr (ph. DB) and another at L. Hollymead, Albemarle 24 & 25 Apr (ph. m. obs.). Four GLOSSY IBIS briefly visited Penicks Mill, *Bedford* 26 Apr (ph. BE, m. obs.) A rare but increasing visitor, a **SWALLOW-TAILED KITE** was observed flying over Sawhill Blvd, Spotsylvania 4 Apr (GJ). There were several migrant Mississippi Kites: one at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 15 May (ph. BB, TB, WC, PM, DS); another at New Bridge Rd., Louisa 18 May (CF); one at Elizabeth Ave., Charlottesville 23 May (ph. WC); and one at IX Art Pk., Charlottesville 26 May (ph. BB, TB). Single Olive-sided Flycatchers were found at Turkey Sag Rd., Albemarle 15 May (ph. MN); Dunlora, Albemarle 23 & 24 May (ph. DC, m. obs); Peaks View Pk., Lynchburg 23 May (ph. LA, GB); RVT 25 May (ph. ES, TS); and Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 25 May (ph. TB, m. obs.). Six vocalizing Alder Flycatchers was a remarkably high count of this rare migrant at Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 24 May (ph. a.r. TB, m.obs.), and reflected a statewide fallout of this species around this date. The sixth regional record of **SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER** put on a show for birders at Blackwater Rd., Bedford 6 & 7 May (ph. CRE, m. obs.).

# **VIREOS-DICKCISSEL**

Quite rare for spring, a **Philadelphia Vireo** was found at L. Orange, *Orange* 5 May (ph. AR, CL). A **White-eyed Vireo** at Gold Mine Marsh, *Louisa* 21 & 22 Mar (ph. AR, CF) was quite early. A **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** at Riveredge Pk., *Amherst* 5 Mar (GS) was also notably early, and it seems plausible that both aforementioned passerines might have overwintered. A singing **Winter Wren** at Hog Camp Gap, *Amherst* 17 (BE, MJ, DMS) & 25 May likely represented a bird on territory. **Marsh Wrens** were found at three sites: up to 4 at Hidden Swamp, *Albemarle* 23–29 Apr (ph. BB, TB, JP, MN, m. obs.); another at Lickinghole Cr, *Albemarle* 28 Apr (a.r. MS); and one at HumanKind Trails, Lynchburg 7 May (ph. LA). Not reported annually in the Region, a singing **Sedge Wren** was present 23 & 24 Apr (ph. a.r BB, TB, JP, MN, m. obs.) at Hidden Swamp, *Albemarle*.

Extremely unexpected, especially outside of irruption winters, an **Evening Grosbeak** visited a feeder and the nearby

Rivanna Trail in Charlottesville (ph. DH, m. obs.) 20–28 Apr. A rare spring migrant in the Region, there were two **Clay-colored Sparrow** reports; one visited a backyard feeder in *Spotsylvania* 7 & 10 Apr (ph. KB) and another was at RVT 13 May (ph. MF). A rare **Lark Sparrow** visited Three Otters Rd., *Bedford* 24–27 Apr (ph. BE, m. obs.) There was a great diversity of warblers detected this spring, with 35 species reported. A rare migrant, a **Brewster's Warbler** (**Goldenwinged** × **Blue-winged Warbler** hybrid) was spotted at Observatory Mt., *Albemarle* 4 May (ph. DC, BB, JP, MN). There were

widespread early arrival Black-and-white Warblers; the earliest were 4 in e. Hanover 27 Mar (AW). A Swainson's Warbler was well documented at RVT 14 May (ph. & a.r. DC). Subsequent efforts failed to detect the bird so it was likely an overshot migrant. There were 2 Orange-crowned Warblers; one at the Holmes Ave. Rivanna Trail, Charlottesville 15 Apr (ph. WC, BB, TB) and one in Earlysville, Albemarle 24 Apr (ph. GB). Although a very uncommon spring migrant, there was only one Mourning Warbler report, that from L. Nelson, Nelson 6 May (AR). A Prairie Warbler 29 Mar at Tardy Mt. Rd. (DMS) was possibly a record early date for the Region. An imm. m. WESTERN TANAGER visited a feeder in Albemarle 22 & 23 Mar (ph. JG, SM) then again 18 Apr. It was refound at a nearby feeder in the same neighborhood shortly thereafter, last seen 21 Apr (ph. TA). Dickcissels were reported widely, from Albemarle, Amherst, Hanover, Louisa, Nelson, and Powhatan.

Temperatures in March and the first half of April were well above average for the Region before dipping below normal for the rest of April and most of May. Precipitation averaged about 1.8 inches below normal overall. It was a tale of two springs. Strong southerlies and warm temperatures in March and early April spurred an early movement of migrant passerines into the Region. Conversely, a series of cold fronts in early May delayed the arrival or departure of others. Early and late dates for certain species are sprinkled throughout the text. Rarities this season included Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, White-winged Dove, Swallow-tailed Kite, Brewer's Blackbird, Western Tanager and Painted Bunting.

#### WATERFOWL-TERNS

A BLACK-BELLIED WHISTLING-DUCK was discovered

in Ford's Colony, James City 29 Apr (ph. VW). The bird was seen again the following day (m.obs.). Possibly the same bird was spotted there 17 & 18 May (ph. GM) and then again 27 May (VW). A late **Gadwall** pair was at Shirley 22 May (E&BO). A lingering Lesser Scaup was present at Sherwood Forest, Williamsburg 23 May (ph. VB, LN). Two **Hooded** Merganser chicks found near a deceased ad. f. in Waverly, Sussex 7 May (CMo) were successfully transferred to a wildlife rehabilitator (ph. 26 May RC via HRWNPG) who raised them to fledging.

A Ruddy Duck noted from Sherwood Forest, Williamsburg lingered until at least 20 May (ph. VB). An ad. Pied-billed Grebe and 4 young were photographed at Dutch Gap/Henricus 29 May (ph. NW). The WHITE-WINGED DOVE recorded in late December from Renwick Pl., Henrico, was last seen 27 Mar (DB). A Common Nighthawk Gospel Spreading Farm, James City 27 Apr was slightly early (NB, BT) as was a Chimney Matoaka **Swift** at L. Woods, Williamsburg 29

 $Mar\ (NN).$  A Ruby-throated Hummingbird arrived at

Governor's Land, James City 1 Apr, setting a new local early date (ph. CO). A Common Gallinule, an uncommon to rare transient, was detected on Treasure Is. Rd., James City 6 Apr (NN). Two Black-necked Stilts were found at Hog 26 May, establishing a 12<sup>th</sup> local record (ph. AD). The number of birds doubled to 4 there by 28 May (NN, CM). Four American Avocets were at Hog 26 Apr, a species rarely seen there in spring (ph. PB). Four Black-bellied **Plovers** passed from Hog over College Cr. 13 Mar, setting a new local early date (BT). A Ruddy Turnstone, rare in the Region at any time of year but especially in spring, was found at Jamestown Is., James City 11

& 12 May (ph. BW). Rare in spring, a **Stilt Sandpiper** was spotted at Hog 22 Apr (ph. AD). Early **Least Sandpipers** were noted at Dutch Gap/Henricus with up to 6 birds present 9–21 Mar (MC, BWo, JW, JS). Three **Red-necked Phalaropes** were found at Hog 22 May (ph. NB) after several days of strong easterly winds which produced quite a few records of this species throughout the state. Up to 3 lingering **Bonaparte's Gulls** were at Hog 26 May (TC, ph. AD). Two **Least Terns** at College Cr. 19 Apr set a new local early date (ph. NB). A **Black Tern**, rare in spring, was off College Cr. 21 May (NB). A **Royal Tern** at College Cr. 3 Mar was early (NB).

#### **SKIMMER-WRENS**

Always rare in the Region, a **Black Skimmer** was at Hog 28 May (ph. NN, CM). A lingering **Common Loon** was in western *Henrico* on Nuckols Rd., Glen Allen 31 May (ph. PS). Now expected in the Region, there were a number of **Anhinga** sightings this season in the Colonial Historic Triangle area led by 22 that passed from College Cr. to Hog 30 Mar (NB, BT, BW), establishing a new local peak count and early date, then 12 that flew from Hog to Jamestown, *James City* 26 Apr (NB). A f. was at the Greensprings Interpretive Trail, *James City* 19 (ph. GM) to 21 Apr (ph. m. obs.). Elsewhere, Anhingas returned once again to Carson Wetland, *Prince George*, with 4 birds first spotted there 18 Apr (AD, TT). These birds and others were seen throughout the period. Widespread nesting of this species is most likely occurring throughout the Region.

An early **Snowy Egret** was at Jamestown Is., *James City* 28 Mar (NB). Also early was a **Green Heron**, seen on the Greensprings Interpretive Trail, *James City* 29 Mar (GM).

A Black-crowned Night-Heron, uncommon this far inland, was spotted in flight at the Wetlands section of JRP 15 May (AB). An ad. Yellow-crowned Night-Heron photographed along SR 626 in Sussex was both uncommon and early (ABr). Two hundred sixteen Turkey Vultures flying across College Cr. 29 Mar set a new high count over 2 hours and 45 minutes of observation (BT). A SWALLOW-TAILED KITE was seen gliding northward over Queens L., York 28 Mar, establishing a new early date and sixth local record (RS). Two Broad-winged Hawks at College Cr. 30 Mar set a new local early date (BW, BT, NB). Twenty American Kestrels counted at College Landing Pk., Williamsburg 29 Mar set a new local one-day peak count (NN, CM). An early Eastern Kingbird was seen at Williamsburg Airport, James City 31 Mar (BT). A Least Flycatcher, a rare spring migrant in the Region, was audio recorded at the Wetlands section of JRP 7 May (AB). There were a number of early White-eyed Vireo sightings this season, with the earliest one recorded at Johnson Millpond, Southampton 24 Mar (TC). An early Blue-headed Vireo was noted at Bryan Pk., Richmond 4 Mar (RB). A Sedge Wren continued at Shirley from the winter season, seen 1 & 5 Mar (ABr).

#### SPARROWS-DICKCISSEL

A **Grasshopper Sparrow** was at Matoaka L. woods, Williamsburg 30 Mar, setting a new local early date (ph. CM, ph. NN).



As many as 6 **Vesper Sparrows** were tallied at Dutch Gap/ Henricus 28 Mar (JD, WT, MC). Singles were noted off Treasure Is. Rd., *James City* 5 & 7 Apr (NN, CJ). A **Lincoln's Sparrow**, a fairly rare spring transient, was at Riverside

Doctor's Hospital Pond, Williamsburg 1 May (AR). A Yellow-breasted Chat continued from the winter season at a suet feeder at Monticello Marketplace, James City until 8 Mar (ph. DC). An **Orchard Oriole** was at Governor's Land, James City 12 Apr, setting a new local early date by one day (CO). A well-described f. **BREWER'S BLACKBIRD** stopped by a residential yard in eastern *Henrico* before heading off to parts unknown 27 Apr (TT). An **Ovenbird** at Tutter's Field, Williamsburg 29 Mar set a new local early date (NN). Sixteen Ovenbirds counted at Warhill Sports Complex, James City 7 Apr established a new local peak count (LSchu). Early Louisiana Waterthrushes included one at York R. SP, *James City* 20 Mar (NB) and one at Redoubt Pk., Williamsburg 20 Mar (CJ). A Blue-winged Warbler at the Wetlands section of JRP 14 May was on the late side (AB). A **Prothonotary Warbler** heard at the Pony Pasture section of JRP 1 Apr was early (AB). Singing Swainson's Warblers were detected in two locations in Southampton this season; one was at the border with *Greensville* at the Meherrin R. 14 & 24 May (ABr, W&BF) and another was farther east near the intersection of The Hall Rd. and Hugo Rd. (ph. JF, JSt). A Nashville Warbler at Echo L. Pk., Henrico 7 Apr was either a really early migrant or a bird that successfully overwintered (ph. KR, SY). Always a rare migrant in the Region, a Mourning Warbler was detected at the Wetlands section of JRP 25 May (v.r. AB, SR, EO). A Cape May Warbler, seen at the 42<sup>nd</sup> St. entrance to JRP 16 May, was running late (PE). Late Yellow-rumped Warblers included one at Bryan Pk., Richmond 22 May (LS, TB) and one at L. Rooty, Henrico 22 May (LM). An ad. m. Western Tanager was in Rolling Woods, James City 17 Mar (DCr). Two ad. m. PAINTED BUNTINGS graced the Region this spring. One was in Ford's Colony, James City 29 Mar, establishing the 16th local record (ph. MS). The other was in Carrollton, Isle of Wight 27 Apr (PO). The only Dickcissel reported in the Region was one at Shirley 22 May (E&BO).

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A total of 220 species was recorded this spring, which is about 5 species below average for recent springs. Data was sourced from the Virginia Birds listserv, eBird\*, NNASnet (Northern Neck Audubon Society listserv), and the Gold Book. Highlights were a Gull-billed Tern, Piping Plover, two groups of American White Pelicans, a singing Sedge Wren, Canada Warblers, a Wilson's Warbler, and Dickcissels.

#### WATERFOWL-RAPTORS

The first eBird record of **Blue-winged Teal** for *Essex* came from Bottom's Neck Marsh 11 Apr (ph. JF). A slightly tardy flock of 30 Green-winged Teal was spotted from a boat on the Rappahannock R. where it meets Brockenbrough Cr., Westmoreland 11 Apr (JF). The latest sighting of Surf **Scoter** for the spring was of 4 birds a few hundred yards nw. of Gwynn Island, Middlesex 19 Apr (DW). The final Black Scoter sighting of the season was coincidentally also of 4 birds, but this time from Bethel 24 Apr (HC, RC). Two scoters photographed at Guinea Marsh, Gloucester 28 May were either Surf or White-winged Scoters, most likely the former (ph. EW). A single Bufflehead lingered until 1 May at Robinson Cr., Middlesex (JCok). An exceptionally late Common Goldeneye was photographed in the company of a Bufflehead along Mill Cr., Northumberland 29 Apr (ph. BW). A f. Hooded Merganser was found at the York River Yacht Haven, Gloucester 27 May (JS). Given the date it's possible this bird attempted to breed nearby. An exciting count of 30 Northern Bobwhites was tallied at a private farm near Howertons, Essex 2 May (LD). A large Wild Turkey flock, even by statewide standards, of 75 birds was found near Weems, Lancaster 3 Mar (JCoo). The night of 9 Apr produced three records of Chuck-will's-widows

near Blakes, *Mathews*, which is approximately two weeks prior to the expected arrival date listed in the Gold Book (CN). The first **Eastern Whip-poor-wills** of the season were detected along Barefords Mill Rd., *Essex* 1 Apr, four days before the expected arrival in the Gold Book (M&JC). The season's first **Ruby-throated Hummingbird** was found coming to a feeder near Rosewell, *Gloucester* 6 Apr (RC); this species typically arrives during the first week of Apr. An **American Golden-Plover**, a very uncommon spring transient through the state, was the Region's first spring record in eBird, found 4 Apr at a private location in Sealston, *King George* (ph. FA).

A single **Piping Plover** at Bethel 26 Apr was two weeks later than any other recent spring record (ph. MS). Although regular during the spring in *Mathews*, **Ruddy Turnstones** are rarely recorded from the Northern Neck during this season. In fact, the first spring eBird record from either *Northumberland* or *Lancaster* came from

Windmill Pt., Lancaster 16 May (LAn, ph. AR). Nine Dunlin, a species not regular on the Northern Neck in spring, were at Leedstown, Westmoreland 4 Apr (ph. FA). A flock of 26 Greater Yellowlegs at Bottom's Neck Marsh 11 Apr (ph. JF) marked a new eBird high count for Essex and was one of the higher counts for the upper reaches of the Rappahannock R. Bethel continues to host Lesser Black-backed Gulls with increasing regularity with an ad. 10 (AR, CL) & 17 Mar (CF). An additional representative of this species was discovered at Currioman Landing, Westmoreland 19 Mar (FA), another location where this species has become somewhat expected as of late. The first Least Tern arrivals were noted at Bethel 24 Apr, which is right around the species' expected arrival date (HC, RC). Two well-described Gull-billed Terns were seen from Windmill Pt., Lancaster 16 May, providing a first eBird record for the Northern Neck (LAn, AR). A late Common **Loon** continued through at least 26 May in the Ware R. near Ware Neck, Gloucester (FR). Two widely separated records, by both location and date, of American White Pelican were reported from the Region. The first was of 6 high-soaring birds from a private location in Montross, Westmoreland 9 Mar (MG) and the second was of 9 at Guinea Marsh, Gloucester 28 May (ph. EW), the latter of which provided a first county eBird record for the species. Individual Cattle Egrets were reported from across the Region, including Heathsville, Northumberland 16 Apr (ph. LN); Dutton, Mathews 27 Apr (PR); Germans Corner, Richmond 28 Apr (LAd); Warsaw, Richmond 30 Apr (BD); and Beaverdam Pk., Gloucester 7 May (ph. SW). Unusual for so far inland, a Yellow-crowned Night-Heron was found in Bruington, King and Queen 21 Apr (NK) and was refound the next day (ph. M&JC). An ad. **Peregrine Falcon** was seen perched on the Robert O. Norris Bridge, Lancaster 31 May where that species has bred in past years (JCoo).

#### FLYCATCHERS-DICKCISSEL

Two **Least Flycatchers**, a scarce spring migrant, were detected, with one each at Beaverdam Pk., *Gloucester* 28 Apr (DY) and Wilna 15 May (MM, RM). A remarkably early **White-eyed Vireo** was heard singing vigorously in Leedstown, *Westmoreland* 19 Mar (FA); this date is two days after the extreme early date listed in the Gold Book for non-wintering birds. The Region's first spring eBird record of a **Philadelphia Vireo** came from a well-described individual near Sassafras, *Gloucester* 2 May (EB). Now more or less expected here, a **Common Raven** near Sealston, *King George* 4 Apr (FA) was still worth noting for its rarity in

the Region as a whole. At the Walkerton Landing Bridge, King William a maximum count of 20 Cliff Swallows was recorded 11 Apr (TB) and 16 May (FA), which was lower than the 40 reported here last year around the same time. A spunky harbinger of spring, the first Blue-gray **Gnatcatcher** was reported 19 Mar from a private location near Dunnsville, Essex (M&JC). Very rarely recorded away from the Region's coastal marshes, a Sedge Wren was observed vigorously singing from Woodbury Rd., King William 1 May (AB). The first Louisiana Waterthrush was noted at "Warbler Bridge" along Union Hope Rd., King and Queen 20 Mar, which was about on par with this species' arrival most years (M&JC). Spring Tennessee Warblers are few and far between, so an individual found 9 May at Wilna was exciting (BK). Two Canada Warblers, a very scarce spring migrant, were detected on two occasions on the same day, with one at Cedar Pointe in Urbanna, Middlesex 13 May (JCok) and the other at "Warbler Bridge" along Union Hope Rd., King and Queen (M&JC). Another species that is often missed in spring, Wilson's Warbler, was heard singing at Hutchinson 28 Apr (M&JC). Up to 3 **Dickcissels** were found along Folly Neck Rd., Richmond after first being sighted 25 May (ph. LAd); these were the only representatives of the species to be seen in the Region this season.

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Accomack and Northampton counties; Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel; Pelagic area; the cities/towns of Cape Charles, Chesapeake, Chincoteague, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Poquoson, Portsmouth, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach

Birders made the best of the state-mandated stay-at-home and social distancing guidelines necessitated by the global health pandemic to chronicle this Region's exceptional species diversity. As the season progressed numerous early and late date observations, annotated below, were posted. Most days were cool, buffeted by what seemed to be ceaseless wind. Annual rainfall by the end of May was ~3.5 inches above normal. For a sixth consecutive year a named cyclonic system churned the Atlantic prior to the June 1 official start of hurricane season. Tropical Storm Arthur formed off southeast Florida then skirted Virginia 18 May. As the storm exited to the northeast a low pressure system was pulled over the Region from the west then lingered to at least 24 May. Those meteorological events delivered seabirds to nearshore waters and stalled passerines' movements. Garganey, Western Grebe, Common Ground-Dove, Roseate and Artic Terns, Crested Caracara, Alder Flycatchers (yes, plural!), and Bicknell's Thrush captured this season's highest accolades.

## **WATERFOWL-ALCIDS**

Twelve Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks were at The Hague, Norfolk 2 May (ph. LW). A Snow Goose was a late season find at Bluebird Gap Farm, Hampton 25 May (ph. RV). Single Mute Swans showed up at Mt. Trashmore/L. Windsor, Virginia Beach 21 Mar (LR, ph. m. obs.) and in Thoroughgood, Virginia Beach 29 Mar (TT). A seemingly healthy Tundra Swan was at Enterprise Parkway, Hampton 23–25 May (ph. EA, m. obs.). Without question the Region's vernal superstar was an ad. m. GARGANEY discovered at Chinc. 4 May (BH, ph. TH). Through 6 May m. obs. posted photos and field notes to document this species' third (per VARCOM) Virginia record.

Two **Gadwalls** lingered at the ESVNWR to 31 May (ESB), more than a month beyond the species' 30 Apr Gold Book average late date. Last reported dates for **Eurasian Wigeons** were 7 Mar for one at Hoffler Creek Pk., Portsmouth (ph. JM) and 14 Mar for one each at Chinc. (m. obs.) and NAS Oceana Pond [restricted], Virginia Beach (ph. RBi, KS). An exceptionally tardy f. **Common Eider** was at Ft. Monroe, Hampton 30 May (ph. SW, TSA). The f. **Harlequin Duck** that was at Little Is. through the winter remained to 19

Mar (m. obs.). A f. Common Goldeneye was at PHP 3 (ph. SM) to 11 Apr (m. obs.); the Gold Book lists this species' average late date as 30 Mar. Five Red-necked Grebe reports showed one at Little Is. 5 Mar (TT), 2 at Little Is. 11 & 13 Mar (AB), and singles in Chincoteague, *Accomack* (MS) and at Back Bay 13 Mar (K&TB). A WESTERN GREBE off Little Is. 12 (ph. BE, JP) & 13 Mar (K&TB) may have been the one at Back Bay 12 Apr (AB, ph. RBi). The COMMON GROUND-DOVE that was in Suffolk in late February was seen at irregular intervals to 27 Mar (*fide* BA).

A White-winged Dove was in the Greater Hilton Area of Newport News 30 Mar (DW). Black-billed Cuckoo reports included one off Jericho Ditch, Dismal 19 (ph. CH, ph. JM) to 26 Apr (ph. KM); one in Cheriton, Northampton 9 May (ESB, ZP); and 2 at Laurel Ditch, Dismal 13 May (GR). A Common Nighthawk was in Churchland, Portsmouth 30 Apr (NF). An Eastern Whip-poor-will was a surprise visitor in Aragona Village, Virginia Beach 28 Mar (ph. KR). The m. Rufous Hummingbird that wintered off Holland Rd., Suffolk was last observed 3 Apr (ph. JB) and the **Selasphorus** *rufous/sasin* that was at a private residence in Virginia Beach continued to 16 Mar (ph. REG). A total of 6 **Common Gallinules** reported 28 Apr included one at Back Bay C Pool (BA), 2 at False Cape (ph. SM, KS), and 3 at Beasley (AB). The Beasley trio were still present 30 Apr (ph. RBi). Subsequently, only one was noted there 2 (SM, WT) to 14 May (ph. RBi). Singles were also at False Cape 30 May (JM) and on the ESVNWR 31 May (ESB). A Sandhill

**Crane** was in Poquoson 27 (RW) & 28 Apr (SN). Another 2 made the drive along Blackwater Rd., Virginia Beach 5 & 6 May (ph. AB, ph. m. obs.) a worthwhile venture. Black-necked Stilts were reported throughout the Region, commencing with one near Cape Charles 15 Apr (ph. ESB, et al.); up to 4 at Messick, Poquoson 23 Apr (ph. DY) to 15 May (ph. m. obs.); and a peak count of 14 at Queen Sound Flats, Accomack 5 May (ph. GR). Eight American Avocets were at Craney 5 Mar (LS, ph. BW); by 12 Mar that number had increased to 27 (DY). Elsewhere, one was at Messick, Poquoson 27 Apr (ph. AC) through 2 May (ph. m. obs.) and 7 were in Cape Charles 24 May (MA, ph. ESB, EC, AL). Were the 4 Whimbrels at Wachapreague, Accomack 8 Mar (ESB, AD, NN, AR, WT) early arrivals or winter holdovers? The Gold Book lists 15 Apr as the species' average arrival date. The Nature Conservancy's annual Whimbrel Watch at Box Tree Cr., Northampton, conducted this year 18-27 May, totaled 3672 birds with a one-day high of 886 on 26 May (AW et al.). Folks scouring the Wildlife Loop at Chinc. were rewarded with a **Ruff** 7–9 May (ph. m. obs.). A White-rumped Sandpiper at Whitehurst 24 Apr (ph. RBi) was six days ahead of the species' more typical 30 Apr arrival. Also early were 2 Pectoral Sandpipers at Craney 12 Mar (BW, DY); 25 Mar is the Gold Book's average early date for that species. A Willet (subspecies unreported) was at Ocean View Beach Pk., Norfolk 15 Apr (DC), five days earlier than the Gold Book's 20 Apr average first appearance. The last "Western" Willet report noted 4 at Red Bank Cr., Northampton 19 May (AL). A Wilson's Phalarope was off LaSalle Ave., Hampton 14 May (ph. EM). Tropical Storm Arthur and its low pressure system companion pushed **Rednecked Phalaropes** into view off Virginia Beach as follows: one off Rudee 19 May (ph. CH, ph. SK, ph. KL) then 2 there (AB, ph. RBi, et al.) and one off 30th St. (ESB) 20 May; 6 at Back Bay (ph. m. obs.), one off 83rd St. (ESB) and 10 off Little Is. (ESB) 21 May; 4 at Rudee 22 May (AB, ph. SM, ph. TM); and one off 85th St. 25 May (AB). Four briefly observed "large alcid sp.," possibly Razorbills, passed off 83rd St., Virginia Beach 19 May (ESB).

#### **GULLS-RAPTORS**

A second-year **Black-legged Kittiwake** was storm-tossed off 83rd St., Virginia Beach 19 May (ESB). A **Bonaparte's Gull** was at Chinc. 29 May (G&HS); after 30 Apr is considered late for this species. The winter season's first-cycle **Iceland Gull** at Ocean View Beach Pk., Norfolk remained through 27 Apr (m. obs.). Others, all first-cycles, included one at Little Is. 1 Mar (ph. KBe) and one to 2 at

Rudee 7 Mar (BA) to 6 Apr (SK). A first-cycle **Glaucous Gull** was at Belle Island Dr., Hampton 18 Apr (ph. CK). **Black Tern** reports listed one off the CCCHNAP 15 May (ESB), a total of 4 off Rudee 20 May (AB, ph. CH, SK), and 2 off 83rd St., Virginia Beach 21 May (ESB). Tropical Storm Arthur and its immediate aftermath systems brought a **ROSEATE TERN** off 15th St., Virginia Beach 18 May (ESB) and a total of 5 **ARCTIC TERNS** past 83rd St., Virginia Beach 21 May (ESB). A deceased Royal Tern found in Norfolk 15 May (ph. BR) had been banded on FINWR as a pre-fledgling 9 Jul 1998. A summary of Sooty Shearwater counts during and after Tropical Storm Arthur included 11 off 83rd St., Virginia Beach 19 May (ph. ESB); 72 off Virginia Beach-83rd St. to Back Bay-(AB, ph. RBi, ESB, SM, et al.) and one off the CBBT (ESB) 20 May; 14 off Virginia Beach-83rd St. to Back Bay 21 May (AB, K&TB, ESB, DC, AD, ph. SM, RR); and one off Rudee 22 May (AB). A Wilson's Storm-Petrel was noted from Little Is. 11 May (AB). Single Leach's **Storm-Petrels** were documented from Little Is. (ph. ESB, RBi) and Ft. Monroe, Hampton (ph. EM) 20 May. The following day one was off Back Bay (AB, AD, WT) in the morning; another was off Little Is. (ESB) that afternoon. The season's first reported **Anhinga** flew over Talbot Pk., Norfolk 28 Mar (BA). Subsequent detections revealed one to 2 intermittently at Blackwater Rd., Chesapeake 4 Apr (ph. KR) to 2 May (ph. LM); 2 at Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 11 Apr (ph. JSn); 2 at Rock Creek Recreation Area [restricted access], Virginia Beach (ph. PM); one at Great Neck Pk. (BS), and one at L. Drummond Causeway, Chesapeake (ph. RBi), all on 2 May; and one at Pine Ridge, Virginia Beach 16 May (ph. MH). The single-site Anhinga high count was 4 near the Virginia Beach Golf Club, Virginia Beach 17 May (SM). An American Bittern at Back Bay 31 May (CF) exceeded the species' 20 May Gold Book late date by eleven days. Single Swallow-tailed Kites were near Eyre Hall, Northampton (MP, MiP) and over Plum Tree Is., Poquoson 12 Apr (NN, ph. JS). Those were followed by an unprecedented total of 3 at Back Bay 16 May (ph. ES, GS, ph. TS). Mississippi Kites have bred in the vicinity of White House Ln., Virginia Beach since 2015. Thus, it was not unexpected that the season's first appeared there 28 Apr (TT) with 2 on hand the next day (TT). One was on the ESVNWR 9 May (ESB). At Apollo Dr./Margaret Dr., Hampton, where this species nested in 2018 and 2019, one to 2 were seen 13 & 16 May (BB, SB). A Barn Owl was heard near Parksley, Accomack 20 Mar (CN); 4 chicks in a box on Mockhorn Marsh,

Northampton 26 Mar (AL) eventually fledged (fide BWa). Potentially Virginia's fourth (per VARCOM) **CRESTED CARACARA** was photo-documented at Thomas Jefferson Rollins Nature Area, Poquoson 23 May (ph. EA, TC).

#### FLYCATCHERS-DICKCISSEL

One of 2 **Western Kingbirds** off Potters Rd., Virginia Beach 2 (ph. MB) through 4 Mar (m. obs.) was still present 14 Mar (ph. m. obs.).

An **Olive-sided Flycatcher** was at First Landing 25 May (ph. JM) and a Yellow-bellied Flycatcher was at False Cape 11 May (ph. AB). There were 3 singing **ALDER FLYCATCHERS** at the Tidewater Arboretum 23 May (ESB). The same day, a total of 10 Willow Flycatchers were accounted for, with 2 at Back Bay (ph., v. r. RBi); 7 at the Tidewater Arboretum (ph. ESB); and one in Oak Springs, Virginia Beach (CP). On 24 May one continued at the Tidewater Arboretum (MC, ph. RR) and one was at Magothy Bay NAP, Northampton (ESB). Single **Least Flycatchers** were at Back Bay 6 May (ph. EA, TC) and the Tidewater Arboretum 23 May (ESB). A **Philadelphia Vireo** was at the CCCHNAP 9 May (ESB) and one was at False Cape 11 May (ph. AB). A list of **Warbling Vireo** observations included one at the CCCHNAP 4 May (ph. ESB, m. obs.); one at Chin. 5 May (ph. MA, EC, JS); one at Back Bay 6 May (ph. EA, TC); one at Sturgis House Dr., Northampton 7 May (ph. ESB, GR); and one to 2 on the ESVNWR 7–10 May (ph. ESB, GR). A Red-eyed Vireo was in Dismal 4 Apr (v.r. TT), three days ahead of the Gold Book's 7 Apr extreme early date. A **Horned Lark** carrying nest material was in the Gates CE East, Suffolk VBBA2 block 31 May (BA). The Gold Book's Purple Martin extreme early date (10 Mar) was

reset by one in Cape Charles 8 Mar (MA, AR). A Brown Creeper was at Back Bay 22 Apr (ph. CH), seven days past the species' 15 Apr Gold Book late date. Coming? Going? Staying in place? Only the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher at Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 11 Mar (ph. BSC) could resolve that enigma; the species' Gold Book typical arrival date is 30 Mar. A Ruby-crowned Kinglet was at the ESVNWR 8 & 9 May (ph. ESB, GR), a bit tardy given that on average this species has vacated the Region by 5 May. A singing **BICKNELL'S THRUSH** was at the ESVNWR 24 May (ph. & v.r. ESB, MP, MiP), marking the third consecutive spring this challenging species has been documented in the Region. A Swainson's Thrush was in Dismal 24 Apr (BA), four days ahead of the species' 28 Apr Gold Book extreme early date. Two Pine Siskins from the winter season hung on at Cypress Pt., Virginia Beach through 8 May (DS); singles were near Woodhouse Corner, Virginia Beach 18 Mar (K&TB) and the CCCHNAP 1 Apr (ESB). The last reported Savannah Sparrow was at Thomas Jefferson Rollins Nature Area, Poquoson 23 May (JS); post 10 May is late for this sparrow. What may have been the same Lincoln's **Sparrow** was at Whitehurst 15 Mar (WT) then 9, 15 (ph. RBi), & 27 Apr (ph. RBi). Another was at Sandy Bottom Pk., Hampton 2 & 7 Apr (ph. NN) and one was at Beasley 28 Apr (AB). A late-exiting White-throated Sparrow was at Burton Station Rd., Virginia Beach 24 May (AB, LR). The Gambel's White-crowned Sparrow that wintered at the Harris Teeter Retention Pond, Virginia Beach continued to 14 Mar (ph. RBi). The average Rusty Blackbird late date is 25 Apr, making one at the CCCHNAP 3 May (ESB, SG) extra special. Up to 8 Brewer's Blackbirds remained at Breeze Farm, Virginia Beach to 15 Mar (ph. m. obs.). Dismal welcomed three early Parulidae worth noting: an Ovenbird detected 27 Mar (ph. BT), two days earlier than average; 2 Worm-eating Warblers on 11 Apr (ph. CH, ph. JM), eight days ahead of the species' 19 Apr Gold Book extreme; and 2 American Redstarts 29 Mar (LR, JS), two days prior to the species' 1 Apr Gold Book extreme. A singing Mourning Warbler was at the Tidewater Arboretum 23 May (AB, ph. m. obs.). Anecdotal evidence suggested a Cape May Warbler at Gale Dr., Virginia Beach 8-10 Mar (ph. MJ) had been present in February. The Prairie Warbler that was at East Water St., Norfolk during the winter lingered to at least 7 Mar (TC). A f. Western Tanager was in the Maple Hall section of Norfolk 4 & 5 Apr (ph. CH). Quite exceptional were 2 f. simultaneously on a Kempsville, Virginia Beach feeder 15 Mar (ph. SMc) then a m. at the same feeder 17 (ph. SMc) & 25 Apr (v.r. SMc)! Preceding the Gold Book's 25 Apr average arrival, an ad. m. Rose-breasted Grosbeak was at the CCCHNAP 19 Apr (ESB, MA). Single Indigo Buntings at False Cape and Back Bay on 10 Apr, (ph. MFM) were well ahead of the Gold Book's 25 Apr early date. A f. Painted Bunting continued at Laurel Manor, Virginia Beach to 13 Apr (ph. TM). Others included an ad. m. at Lakeside Pk., Chesapeake 16 (ph. DG) & 17 Apr (ph. BSC); a f. near Ocean L. Pk., Virginia Beach 1 May (ph. KM); and a f. at Whitehurst 3 (ph. RBi) & 4 May (CH, SK). A Dickcissel at Machipongo, Northampton 9 May (DC) was the first of up to 3 at the site to 19 May (ESB, GR); one was in Cape Charles 21–31 May (ph. m. obs.) and one was off Seaside Rd. near Jones Cove., Northampton 31 May (ESB).

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
