Editor's Corner

As I pick up the reins of Virginia Birds, I am moved to think about the debt of gratitude owed to previous editorial teams for their tremendous work in establishing and maintaining this publication as the journal of ornithological record for our great Commonwealth. Looking back to this journal's founding in 2004 – nearly 20 years ago, if one can believe it! - I am mindful of Todd Day's charge for Virginia Birds to be "a tool to paint the avian landscape of our state in a way the broad brush-strokes of North American Birds and the range maps in various field guides cannot." In the intervening decades, through ups and downs, and with the changing tides of Virginia birding, I think we can say that Virginia Birds has done just that! In my tenure as editor, it is my sincere hope that the journal can continue to undertake this important work, providing Virginia birders with a compendium of our state's ornithological history and synthesizing the raw data of our field observations into something meaningful - as previous editor Bill Williams put it in his reflections on a decade of Virginia Birds, to "render that content into context."

I am fortunate to be supported in that endeavor by a fine editorial team. Together, the Regional Editors of this journal comprise a remarkable cross-section of Virginia's birding expertise. In addition to being some of the finest field birders in the state, these folks bring scads of specialized knowledge about the micro-distribution and ornithological history of their Regions. Moreover, the current slate of Regional Editors cuts across the generations of Virginia birding to combine a long historical perspective with a keen attention to more recent trends and innovations in birds and birding. Notably, three of our current editors - Fred Atwood, Adam D'Onofrio, and C. Michael Stinson – have been with Virginia Birds since its inception. We have also seen some changes, and I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the recent retirements of two esteemed Regional Editors - Clyde Kessler, who edited the West Region since 2009 and Bill Williams, who edited the Coastal Region since 2005. Bill also merits special mention not only as an outgoing Regional Editor, but as a steady hand on the helm since the Winter 2013/2014 issue, when he began an interim editorship that ultimately evolved into a seven-year tenure. His editorship helped this journal maintain its place at the forefront of Virginia avian recordkeeping, and I owe much to Bill's leadership. Even in his "retirement," Bill has been a fountain of wisdom and advice as I work to revitalize *Virginia Birds*.

Indeed, I step into the editorship of a journal that is at a crossroads. The past two years of the pandemic have been nothing if not unkind to the normal rhythms of life, and Virginia Birds was no exception. At the time of this writing, it has been two years since the last issue was published. My first priority as editor is to bridge this gap and honor the diligent efforts of our Regional Editors by publishing the existing columns spanning Fall 2020 to the present. This issue will cover only Fall 2020, an exciting time for Virginia birding and one not likely to be duplicated in the recent future (read on to hear more about this momentous fall!). Subsequent issues will likely combine multiple seasons in an effort to get the journal caught up to its regular publication schedule. Going forward, reestablishing a timely publication schedule will be a top priority for me. It is also my hope to elevate Virginia Birds beyond being simply a repository of sightings. To remain vital, we must offer more than simply a list – today's birders have ample avenues to seek raw data on sightings, whether this be eBird, VARCOM records, social media, or elsewhere. The niche for Virginia Birds is in putting these sightings into context, giving Virginia's birders a way to see how our field observations contribute to a larger picture of birdlife in Commonwealth. As editor, I see this as part of my role, and I plan to include essays, sketches, thoughts, or musings that bring context to the sightings contained herein. I also welcome contributions from you, dear reader!

Regional Reports

NORTH



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Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun, Madison, Prince William, Rappahannock, and Stafford counties; the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax City, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park

Highlights this season included a long-lingering inland Clapper Rail at Huntley Meadows, a Sabine's Gull at several locations along the Potomac R., a Western Kingbird along Colchester Rd., *Loudoun*, and a Say's Phoebe at Sully Woodlands, *Fairfax*. Also notable and a highlight for many was a major irruption of Evening Grosbeaks into the state, not seen since at least 1978.

WATERFOWL — SHOREBIRDS

Single **Cackling Geese**, usually a fairly rare winter visitor in the Region, were seen at Fleetwood Hill Battlefield, *Culpeper* 20 Oct (KK); flying over the Potomac Heritage Trail,

Loudoun 27 Oct (AG, BHe); and C.M. Crockett Pk., Fauquier 31 Oct (BD, LD). The Piedmont early date is 30 Nov, and there are only 2 other confirmed Oct records in all of the Piedmont. Two late Blue-winged Teal showed up at the Middlesex Dr. pond, Loudoun 22 Nov (AH, AN), far past the 20 Oct Regional late date. A Greenwinged Teal seen at the Colvin Ln. pond, Prince William 28 Aug (ph. AH) was significantly earlier than the species' 30 Sep early date in the Piedmont. Also significantly early was a Canvasback at Occoquan Bay NWR 12-14 Oct (LC, AJ); the Coastal Plain early date is 10 Nov. Reports of Surf Scoters, a rare visitor in the Region and more in the inland Piedmont, included 3 at the Upper Occoquan Service Authority, Fairfax 25 Oct (DLe); singles at Belmont Bay Marina, Prince William 26 Oct (KG) and C.M. Crockett Pk., Fauquier 29 Oct (GS); and 2 at Burke L. Pk. 12 Nov (DLe). Also rare in the Region, especially the Piedmont, were a f. White-winged Scoter observed at Occoquan Bay NWR 26–28 Oct (ph. JAl); 10 Black Scoters at Burke L. Pk. 25 Oct (FA); and a Long-tailed Duck at Aquia Landing Pk. 14 Nov (KG). A f. **Bufflehead** spent time at the Mooreview Pkwy. impoundments, Loudoun 5-28 Aug (BHi, HS), far outside the extreme Piedmont date range of 24 Oct – 27 Apr. An early **Black-billed Cuckoo** was seen at Jones Nature Preserve, Rappahannock 12 Aug (IT); in the Coastal Plain, where the species is a rare transient away from the coast, singles were seen at Occoquan Bay NWR 14 Sep (JPl)

and Huntley Meadows 22 Sep (PB, SSu). Two **Red-necked Grebes**, a rare inland transient, were seen at Aquia Landing Pk. 16 Nov (DG). A **Ruby-throated Hummingbird** was seen at a residence on Allison St., Alexandria 28 Oct (SH), well past the Coastal Plain late date of 25 Sep. A **CLAPPER RAIL**, very rare this far inland and away from salt marsh, was seen at Huntley Meadows 26 Oct (ph. CS), where it lingered and was seen by m.obs. through the period. Two

Sandhill Cranes were observed flying over Algonkian Nature Preserve, Loudoun 26 & 27 Nov (BHe), probably the pair that has overwintered the past 3 years here and upriver. An American Avocet, rare this far inland, was seen at Hunting Cr. Bridge, Fairfax 29 Aug (DLe). A Black-bellied Plover, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was seen at fields along Cemetery Rd., Fauquier 1 Sep (GDi). Reports of American Golden-Plovers, a rare but regular fall transient in the Piedmont, included 2 at Woodward Turf Farm, Culpeper 27 Aug (BB, TMD), with as many as 7 seen there and a few at nearby fields along Cemetery Rd., Fauquier through 5 Sep. Also rare in the Piedmont in the fall were 21 Stilt Sandpipers found at Woodward Turf Farm, Fauquier 4 Aug (TMD, IT), with one seen at nearby Cemetery Rd. fields 19–27 Aug (GS, ph. TMD); 2 extremely late birds were apparently seen near the McRaes Rd. pond, Fauguier 31 Oct (GS, SSI) & 1 Nov (KS). Although the Gold Book gives the Piedmont extreme late date as 12 Sep, both the Coastal Plain and Mountains sectors give extreme late

dates in early Nov. Also making rare fall appearances in the Piedmont were 2 early **Sanderlings** at Woodward Turf Farm, *Fauguier* 4 Aug (TMD, IT) (the Piedmont extreme early date is 18 Aug), as well as **Dunlin**: one at Four Mile Run Pk. 6 Oct (DLe); 2 at Meadowbrook Farm ponds, Loudoun 28 Oct – 7 Nov (ph. DN); and 3 at Lenn Pk., Culpeper 1 Nov (ph. KK). Reports of **Buff-breasted Sandpipers**, another rare fall transient in the Piedmont, included 4 at Woodward Turf Farm, Culpeper 27–30 Aug (BB, TMD) and one at Haverford Square fields, Loudoun 3 Sep (BHe). Yet another rare fall transient in the Piedmont, a Short-billed **Dowitcher** was seen at Remington Cemetery, Fauquier 19 Aug (SL, PSa). A WILLET made a rare appearance w. of the Chesapeake Bay near Belle Haven Pk., Fairfax 6 Sep (KG, RR) (one of just a dozen known records in the Coastal Plain.

TERNS — RAPTORS

A **Royal Tern** was at Aquia Landing Pk. 15 Sep (ph. CF), with 2 seen there 30 Sep; another appeared 31 Oct (KG). The rare post-breeding dispersal visits of this species into the Region usually end by the end of Sep. American Bitterns, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, were seen along Chompawampsic Cr., Prince William 2 Sep (ph. KG); at the Clifton Institute, Fauquier 10 Sep (BHa); Bles Pk., Loudoun 24 Sep (CL); and Belvoir Pond, Fauquier 29 Oct (TMD). A Least Bittern, reported at Occoquan Bay NWR 16 Oct (JAI), was either the same bird that has been there since spring or a late migrant (Coastal Plain late date 20 Sep). Juv. Yellowcrowned Night-Herons, rare this far inland, were observed at Silver L. RP, Prince William 15 Aug (ph. TH) and Woodbridge Veterans Memorial Pk., Prince William 23 Sep (KG) and again 5 Oct. There were several reports of juv. White Ibis, also rare inland, including singles at Pohick Bay RP, Fairfax 7 Aug (AN); Olde Izaak Walton Pk., Loudoun 20 Aug (ph. CL); and Effingham Manor Winery ponds, Prince William 21 Aug (ph. SK). Two found at Vienna Res., Fairfax 23 Aug (JAs) were seen and ph. by many

through 14 Sep. Two Swallow-tailed Kites, a rare but increasing visitor in the Piedmont, were first observed along Botts Ln. near Woodville, Rappahannock in late Jul and continued through 9 Aug (ph., m.obs.). Another was seen near Graves Mill Trail, Madison 25-27 Aug (KR). A pair of Mississippi Kites seen feeding young at the nest site at Forest Manor, Loudoun 4 Aug (ph. BHi), where they have bred for 3 years, remained through at least 23 Aug (m. obs.). A Northern **Red-tailed** Hawk (Buteo jamaicensis abieticola), a putative subspecies that is not uniformly recognized as separate from the Eastern subspecies, was seen at Belvoir Pond, Fauquier 5 Nov (TMD). A Merlin, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was seen at Algonkian RP, Loudoun 15 Sep (MMas, DN). Sightings of Peregrine Falcons, also a rare transient in the Piedmont, included a bird making several passes at shorebirds at Woodward Turf Farm, Culpeper 28-30 Aug (TMD, IT); as well as singles at a residence in Taylorstown, Loudoun 11 Sep (GH) and Claude Moore Pk., Loudoun 5 Nov (AG, BHe). A summary of the fall count at Snickers Hawkwatch, Loudoun included: Ospreys, 10 Golden Eagles (including 4 on 2 Nov), 40 Northern Harriers, 444 Sharpshinned Hawks, 69 Cooper's Hawks, 1 Northern Goshawk (ad., 8 Nov), 207 Bald Eagles, 74 Red-shouldered Hawks, 3,935 **Broad-winged Hawks**, 696 Red-tailed Hawks, 44 American Kestrels, 9 Merlins, and 6 Peregrine Falcons.

FLYCATCHERS — THRUSHES

A Western Kingbird, very rare in the Region, was well-seen along Colchester Rd., *Loudoun* 6 Nov (ph. ML). There were many reports of **Olive-sided Flycatchers**, a fairly rare transient in the Region (rare in the Mountains sector), mostly in the Piedmont with over 10 reports, including 3 seen separately over 24 days along the Turquoise Trail in Reston, *Fairfax* 26 Aug – 19 Sep (ph. PH); and one at Big Meadows within Shenandoah NP, *Madison* 30 Aug (MMo). A late **Eastern Wood-Pewee** was seen at Sky Meadows SP,

Fauquier 24 Oct (NVBC), just past the Piedmont extreme late date of 23 Oct. There were numerous reports of **Yellow-bellied Flycatchers**, a rare transient in the Region, including 2 on the Turquoise Trail in Reston, Fairfax 2 Sep (ph. PH); 3 sightings over a week at Leesylvania SP, Prince William 12–20 Sep (SPr); and 2 at Occoquan Bay NWR 15 Sep (SK). A **SAY'S PHOEBE**, very rare in the state with only four previous confirmed records in the Piedmont, was seen at Sully Woodlands 20 Sep (ph. KF). A late **Yellow-throated Vireo** was observed at Monticello Pk., Alexandria 21 Oct (TA), just past the Coastal Plain extreme late date of 20 Oct.

Blue-headed Vireos were observed at private residences in Clifton, *Fairfax* 7 Sep (EK) and Ashburn, *Loudoun* 22 Nov (JE), both well outside the fall Piedmont date range of 25 Sep – 30 Oct. A **Philadelphia Vireo** seen at Luria Pk., *Fairfax* 4 Nov (ph. B&DF) was well past the Piedmont extreme late date of 24 Oct. A **Warbling Vireo**, a rare transient in the Coastal Plain, was seen at Occoquan Bay NWR 3 Oct (EP). Reports of somewhat early **Red-breasted Nuthatches** (Mountains usual early date is 15 Sep) included a single at Pinnacles Overlook, Shenandoah NP, *Rappahannock* 1 Aug (TK) and 2 at Old Rag Mtn., Shenandoah NP, *Madison* 30 Aug (GM). It

is worth noting that they are local breeders at high elevations w. of the Blue Ridge; it should also be noted that although the Gold Book does not give an extreme early date for the Mountains sector, it gives 2 Aug for the nearby Piedmont. Sedge Wrens, a rare transient in the Piedmont, were seen at Meadowood Recreation Area, Fairfax 15-23 Aug (ph. QE, HM), with one seen there again 4 Oct (LC, AJ); Waples Mill Meadow Pk. 2 Oct – 6 Nov (ph. JB); and Riverbend Pk. 8 Nov (ph. BHo). A Marsh Wren at L. Fairfax Pk. 5 Aug (DY) was considerably earlier than the 5 Sep Piedmont early date; another found there 6 Nov (PH) and one at Leopold's Preserve 22-29 Nov (FA) were present well past the Piedmont late date of 20 Oct. There were several sightings of Blue-gray Gnatcatchers considerably past the 20 Sep late date for the Region, where the species is a rare winter visitor: at a residence in Taylorstown, Loudoun 9 Oct (GH); Rady Pk., Fauquier 20 Oct (ph. TMD); Accotink Bay NWR, Fairfax 13 Nov (ph. MMi); Occoquan Bay NWR 14 Nov (EP); and Leesylvania SP, Prince William 15 Nov (PSi). An early Goldencrowned Kinglet seen at Occoquan Bay NWR 20 Sep (MMay) just beat the Coastal Plain extreme early date of 21 Sep. Steve Young found a bonanza of Ruby-crowned Kinglets at Sparrow Pond along the W&OD Trail between Rt. 50 and Columbia Pike, Arlington 25 Oct, counting over 50 during a 2-hour walk, with more in nearby parkland. Well before the Mountains and Piedmont extreme early dates in early October were Hermit Thrushes found along Limberlost Trail in Shenandoah NP, Madison 15 Sep (IT) and at Great Falls NP, Fairfax 16 Sep (KL, JS). Reports of late Veeries included one at Daniels Run Pk., Fairfax City 13 Oct (P&JW) and 2 at L. Fairfax Pk. 17 Oct (MV) (Piedmont extreme late date 8 Oct).

GROSBEAKS — DICKCISSEL

The period saw a major irruption of **Evening Grosbeaks** into the state; typically rare this far south, these northern wanderers appeared in

numbers as high as 9 and 12 in the Piedmont sector of the Region. The Red Crossbill reported in the last period at the Pinnacles picnic area in Shenandoah NP, Madison on 30 Jul continued through 15 Oct, with up to 5 seen and ph. by many. Two were reported several mi. s. along the ridge at Hawksbill Mtn. in Shenandoah NP, Madison 18 Sep (ES, TS). Two ventured into the Piedmont, seen along Leeds Manor Rd., Fauquier 24 Nov (BHa). This species is rare in all seasons even in its preferred higher elevations, and is typically found w. of the Blue Ridge. A WHITE-WINGED CROSSBILL, also a rare and irregular transient in the state, was seen and ph. in a residential backyard in Brambleton, Loudoun 14 Nov (BHi). An early Pine Siskin, whose Coastal Plain extreme early date is 1 Oct, was seen at Huntley Meadows 23 Sep (OE, KG); this was also an irruption year for this species. Late **Grasshopper Sparrows** were seen at Sully Woodlands 8 Nov (PH) and the Discovery Blvd. pond, Prince William 20 Nov (ph. TH), the latter well past the Piedmont extreme late date of 5 Nov. Sightings of Clay-colored Sparrows, a rare transient in the Region, especially in the Piedmont. included at a residence Taylorstown, Loudoun 17 Oct (GH); near the Meadowbrook Farm ponds, Loudoun 18 Nov (CL); and Manassas Nat. Battlefield Pk., Prince William 20 Oct (ph. W&CW). Reports of Savannah Sparrows prior to the Coastal Plain and Piedmont early date of 15 Sep included 6 along Grassdale Rd., Fauquier 13 Aug (TMD) (the species is a rare summer resident in nw. Fauquier) and one at Reagan Nat. Airport, Arlington 30 Aug (ph. TK). Early Lincoln's **Sparrows**, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont with an extreme early date of 11 Sep, were seen at Waples Mill Meadow Pk. 6 Sep (JB) and Sully Woodlands 7 Sep (SJ). Baltimore Orioles, a rare late fall and winter visitor in the Piedmont and Coastal Plain, were seen at Silver L. RP, Prince William 20 Oct (ph. MMas); Waples Mill Meadow Pk. 21 Oct (FA, AN); Jones Point Pk., Alexandria 26 Oct (ph. MR); and a residence in Taylorstown, Loudoun 6 Nov (GH), well past the species' usual Piedmont and Coastal Plain late

date of 30 Sep. A **Golden-winged Warbler**, a rare transient away from the Blue Ridge, found its way to Frying Pan Farm Pk., *Fairfax* 11 Sep (ph. AN), while a late **Black-and-white Warbler** surprised the observer at L. Fairfax Pk. 29 Nov (JT). The normal late date for the latter species is 15 Oct in the Piedmont, where it is a rare early winter visitor. Late **Prothonotary Warblers**

were encountered at a residence s. of Manassas, Prince William 27 Sep (DV) (Piedmont late date 10 Sep) and at Huntley Meadows 3 Oct (DS) (Coastal Plain late date 15 Sep). There were several sightings of Orange-crowned Warblers, a rare transient in the Region: Banshee Reeks Nature Preserve, Loudoun 10 Oct (LM); Luria Pk., Fairfax 14 Oct (ph. B&DF); Jones Nature Preserve, Rappahannock 20 Oct (IT); sw. of Round Hill, Loudoun 20 Oct (JCo); Meadowood Recreation Area, Fairfax 23 Oct (SJ); Wakefield Pk., Fairfax 28 Oct (SE); Mason Neck SP, Fairfax 6 Nov (BJ); and Laurel Hill Equestrian Center, Fairfax 13 Nov (ph. SPr). The season brought unusually numerous observations of Connecticut Warblers, a rare and always highly sought migrant, with at least a dozen reliable reports across the Region: Monticello Pk., Alexandria 12–15 Sep (CF); Julie J. Metz Wetlands Bank, Prince William 17 Sep (KG); Upton Hill RP, Arlington 25 Sep – 7 Oct (MMo); Rust Sanctuary, Loudoun 27 Sep (BHe); Sully Woodlands 2-3 Oct (MF); Riverbend Pk. 3-23 Oct (MT, ph. m.obs.), where at least 2, maybe 3, were seen 10 Oct (BHo); residential Centreville, Fairfax 4 Oct (ph. KF); Dulles Greenway Wetlands Mitigation Project, Loudoun 4 Oct (ph.

MMy, ph. MSci); Occoquan Bay NWR 5 Oct (LC, AJ); Elklick Woodlands NAP, Fairfax 7 Oct (SJ); Four Mile Run Pk. 9 Oct (TK); the Fairfax Hospital pond, Fairfax 11 Oct (P&JW); Belle Haven Pk., Fairfax 11-15 Oct (KG); and Manassas Nat. Battlefield Pk., Prince William 18 Oct (WW). Reports of Mourning Warblers, another rare transient, were also numerous and included sightings at Leopold's Preserve 29 Aug (MA); Difficult Run Stream Valley Pk., Fairfax 30 Aug (ph. JB) and 19 Sep (ph. TN); Julie J. Metz Wetlands Bank, Prince William 30 Aug (JAI); and Riverbend Pk. 25 Sep – 9 Oct (RH, KL, MT). **Reports** of late Common ph. Yellowthroats included along the Turquoise Trail in Reston, Fairfax 5 Nov (PH); L. Mooney Pk., Stafford 14 Nov (JeP, JoP); Walker Nature Center, Fairfax 21 Nov (TJ); Four Mile Run Pk. 22 Nov (CM); Jones Point Pk., Alexandria 22 Nov (BS); and L. Audubon, Fairfax 29 Nov (PH). The Coastal Plain and Piedmont late dates are 25 Oct and 20 Oct, respectively. A Hooded Warbler was seen in Taylorstown, Loudoun 5 Oct (ph. JS-T), well after the species' Piedmont extreme late date of 20 Sep. Also late were Cape May Warblers seen at Occoquan Bay NWR 31 Oct (ph. EP); along the Potomac Heritage Trail, Arlington 9 Nov (MG); and at Regency Golf Course & Nature Trail, Prince William 9 Nov (DLa); the Coastal Plain and Piedmont late dates are 25 Oct and 20 Oct, respectively. A Northern Parula at Dyke Marsh 28 Nov (EE) was considerably later than the Coastal Plain extreme late date of 31 Oct. Late Magnolia Warblers seen at Burke L. Pk. 24 Oct (BC); Dulles Airport pond, Loudoun 25 Oct (BHe); and Morven Pk., Loudoun 28 Oct (MSco) were after the species' Piedmont extreme late date of 18 Oct. A Yellow Warbler, whose Coastal Plain extreme late date is 31 Oct, was seen at Occoquan Bay NWR 24 Nov (LC, AJ). Late Palm Warblers, whose Regional late date is 30 Oct, were seen in Manassas, Prince William 14 Nov (MO); Copley Farm, Stafford 15 Nov (JG); Green Spring Garden Pk., Fairfax 15 Nov (JM); L. Fairfax Pk. 22 Nov (GB); and Leopold's Preserve 22 Nov (FA); this species is a rare early winter visitor in the Piedmont and fairly rare in the inland Coastal Plain. A late **Pine Warbler** seen along Hebron Valley Rd., Madison 9 Nov (GDe) was well beyond the Piedmont late date of 10 Oct; this species is a rare winter resident outside of the Coastal Plain. A Yellow-throated Warbler, whose usual Coastal Plain late date is 31 Aug, lingered at Dyke Marsh from 13 Oct to 28 Nov (m.obs., ph. PM), beyond even the extreme late date of 27 Nov. Also late were Prairie Warblers seen at Sky Meadows SP, Fauquier 30 Sep (TMD) (Piedmont extreme late date 28 Sep) and Four Mile Run Pk. 22 Oct (TK) (Coastal Plain late date 20 Sep). There were numerous September reports of Yellow-rumped Warblers in the Piedmont, well before the extreme early date of 28 Sep. Six were noted in the Pinnacles picnic area of Shenandoah NP, Madison 2 Sep (IT), where the Mountains early date is 25 Sep; an individual found on the Story of the Forest Nature Trail in Shenandoah NP, Madison 2 Aug (DH) may have been a rare (but increasing) breeder. A Summer Tanager past the Piedmont extreme late date of 5 Oct was seen near Gainesville, Prince William 7 Oct (SF). A Rosebreasted Grosbeak lingered at a residence in Taylorstown, Loudoun 25–30 Oct (GH) (Piedmont late date 10 Oct). Also late were a Blue Grosbeak at Waples Mill Meadow Pk. 27 Oct (FA, JCl, AH, MMas) (Piedmont extreme late date 22 Oct) and an **Indigo Bunting** at Aquia Landing Pk. 14 Nov (KG) (Coastal Plain extreme late date 9 Nov). Single Dickcissels, a rare and irregular transient in the Region, were observed at Occoquan Bay NWR 30 Sep (JH, PSi) and Leopold's Preserve 19 Oct (TH).

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WEST



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Alleghany, Augusta, Bath, Botetourt, Clarke, Craig, Frederick, Giles, Highland, Montgomery, Page, Pulaski, Roanoke, Rockbridge, Rockingham, Shenandoah, and Warren counties; the cities of Buena Vista, Covington, Harrisonburg, Lexington, Radford, Roanoke, Salem, Staunton, Waynesboro, and Winchester.

The weather this fall seemed to favor the southern part of this Region, particularly when it came to shorebirds. Several rainstorms produced large shorebird fallouts in *Montgomery* and *Pulaski* in particular, but further north shorebirds were present in either average or below average numbers this fall. Waterfowl numbers were also fairly low across the board. Passerine showed good diversity as is typical, but the large finch irruption — particularly of Evening Grosbeaks, was the one of the most noteworthy parts of the season. Evening Grosbeaks were present in numbers not seen since the 1990's throughout the Region, along with above average numbers of Pine Siskin and Purple Finch.

WATERFOWL — CRANES

Up to two **Ross's Geese** were at the NRV Fairgrounds, *Pulaski* 7-28 Nov (ph. m. obs.). Another was seen flying over the Snickers Gap Hawkwatch, *Clarke* 18 Sep (ph. MF) – a very odd

spot for one! There was an impressive flight of Tundra Swans throughout the Region 12 Nov. High counts included 80 at Blandy (J&BJL); 194 in Waynesboro (VL); and 110 in Roanoke (KC). It was an excellent fall for Surf Scoters in the Region. One was at the Broadway WTP 7-14 October (DH, ph. MG) and another 2 were there 12-13 Nov (DH, MG); 4 were at L. Frederick, Frederick 26 Oct (ph. DB, BP); 3 were at Stuarts Draft WTP 26 Oct (ph. CF, DCh, IL); 4 were at L. Holiday, Frederick 29 Oct (GR); one was at Tinker Mill, Botetourt 11 Nov (BK); and three were at L. Arrowhead, Page 12 Nov (DH). A White-winged Scoter was at Abrams Cr. Wetlands Preserve, Frederick 4-7 Nov (ph. DC, m. obs.), while another 4 were at L. Arrowhead 26 Oct (DH, SS). The only report of **Black Scoter** was a surprising count of 5 females at L. Holiday, Frederick 29 Oct (GR). It was a good fall for hummingbirds in the Region with several reports of Rufous Hummingbirds. One was at Fortune Ridge Rd., Roanoke 16-25 Oct (ph. KD, m. obs.); an ad. m. was at Spring Creek Rd., Rockingham 23-25 Oct (ph. GMo, m. obs.); one was at Rainbow Trail, Rockingham 4 Nov through the end of the period; and another was at Morris Mill Rd., Augusta 18 Nov (AL). The star of the show in the hummingbird department was a **CALLIOPE HUMMINGBIRD** at Purple Cow Rd., Augusta from 25 Oct through the end of the period. This was just the fourth state record and the first for the Mountains and Valleys. A Virginia Rail was at Seven Fountains Pond, Shenandoah 17 Oct (DGe), with other reports of one at Heritage Community Park, Montgomery

19-24 Oct (LA, m. obs.); one at Gala Wetlands, *Botetourt* 24 Oct (AD); and 2 at Abrams Cr. Wetlands Preserve, *Frederick* 8 Nov (DG, EG). A **Sora** was at the Vet School Pond 27 Sep (ph. MN); others were 2 at the Gala Wetlands 26 Oct (MB); one at Switzer L., *Rockingham* 8 Nov (PN); and one in a yard in *Salem* 25 Nov (ph. ER). A **Common Gallinule** was at the Botetourt Center, *Botetourt* 26 Sep (BK, JP, BE). A flock of 8 **Sandhill Cranes** flew over Blandy 20 Nov (ph. DC).

SHOREBIRDS — OWLS

One American Avocet was at L. Arrowhead, Page 28 Sep (DH). A Black-bellied Plover was at the VT Airport 31 Aug - 1 Sep (KG). Later, 2 were seen at the same location as part of a large shorebird fallout 17-18 Sep (LA). One was also at the NRV Fairgrounds on 17 Sep (MM). American Golden Plovers were present in good numbers this fall. As usual, the most reliable spot was central Rockingham, particularly the area around the Shenandoah Valley Produce Auction. Up to 47 were reported in that area or at the nearby Oakwood Dr. Pond from 31 Aug-31 Oct (m. obs.), with the peak count on 29 Sep (LB). There were several records of single birds at the VT Airport 5-18 Sep (m. obs.), followed by an impressive count of 39 there on 12 Nov (JG, LA, XG). One was also at the NRV Fairgrounds 10 Sep (ph. MM); 3 were at Blandy 13 Oct (ph. DC, DB); and up to 5 were on Guthrie Rd., Augusta 1-14 Nov (ph. AL, VL). The only Ruddy **Turnstone** reports for the area were one at the VT Airport 30 Aug - 9 Sep (ph. MN, m. obs.) and one at Lumber Mill Rd., Rockingham 1-5 Sep (DH, m. obs.). One Stilt Sandpiper was at the Roanoke STP 16 Aug (ph. KD); another was at the NRV Fairgrounds 16-29 Aug (ph. LA, m. obs.); 9 were at Quillen's Pond, Augusta 16 Aug (ph. IL, m. obs.); and a single bird was later there 3-5 Sep (ph. DCh, m. obs.). Most impressive was an incredible 28 at the Virginia Tech Airport 17 Sep (ph. MN, m. obs.). Besides these more notable species, this same fallout produced

counts of 70 **Pectoral Sandpipers** at the Shenandoah Valley Produce Action, Rockingham 19 Sep (WL) and VT Airport 17 Sep (LA, MN, m. obs.), as well as 111 Lesser Yellowlegs at the latter location, which were quite impressive for our Region. One Sanderling was at the Broadway WTP 8 Sep (DH) and 2 were at L. Holiday, Frederick 29 Oct (GR). A Dunlin was at Greenfield Center, Botetourt 16 Sep (JM); up to 5 were at the VT Airport 29-30 Oct (ph.PL, m. obs.); 2 were at the NRV Fairgrounds 30 Oct (ph. PL) and a single bird was there 13 Nov (DH); 3 were at the Broadway WTP 29 Oct (MG); and singles were at the Oakwood Dr. Pond, Rockingham 31 Oct (GMo), Leonard's Pond 31 Oct - 2 Nov (DH) and Forestville Pond 8 Nov (DH). In stark contrast to last fall, only one White-rumped Sandpiper was reported, at Quillen's Pond, Augusta 5 Aug (AL). A single **Buff-breasted Sandpiper** was at the VT Airport 29-31 Aug (ph. LA, m. obs.); one was at the Roanoke STP 29 Aug (KD, AD); and up to 3 were in the vicinity of the Shenandoah Valley Produce Auction, Rockingham 3 Sep - 6 Oct (DH, m. obs.). A Short-billed Dowitcher was at the NRV Fairgrounds 17-29 Aug (SC, ph. LA, m. obs.); one was at Quillen's Pond, Augusta 12-13 Sep (ph. VL); and one was on Narrow Back Rd., Augusta 17 Sep (GM). Two Red-necked **Phalaropes** were at the Broadway WTP 8-9 Sep (DH). A Laughing Gull was at Willow L., Rockbridge 25 Oct (ph. LA). Oddly, the only Caspian Terns reported in the Region this fall were 2 at L. Arrowhead, Page 19 Aug (SS) and one at Claytor L., Pulaski 18 Sep (BC, KS). A **Black Tern** was at L. Moomaw, *Bath* 11 Aug (ph. JG); 2 were at the NRV Fairgrounds 29 Aug (ph. WC, m. obs.); 2 were at the Broadway WTP 29 Aug and one was there 9 Sep (DH); 2 were at Silver L., Rockingham 29 Aug (DH); one was at Oakwood Dr. Pond, Rockingham 14 Sep (HJ); and one was at Claytor Lake SP, Pulaski 12 Oct (LA, AP). A **Common Tern** was at L. Holiday, Frederick 29 Oct (GR). A MAGNIFICENT FRIGATEBIRD at L. Holiday, Frederick 25 Sep (ph. GR) would be a remarkable record at any time but is especially notable since it was not associated with any tropical storm system. This is the first record for the West Region and the second for the Mountains and Valleys. Even more incredibly, another frigatebird was photographed at the same location 29 Nov (ph. fide GR). One American Bittern was at Bell's Ln., Staunton 20 Oct (ph. MK); another was at the Mulberry Run Constructed Wetland, Waynesboro 25 Oct (ph. MA, JF, ph. NN); and one was at the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute, Warren 4 Nov (CC). A Cattle Egret was at the NRV Fairgrounds 9 Nov (ph. DH, m. obs.). A juv. White Ibis was at the Broadway WTP 10 Aug (ph. MG). A Swallow-tailed Kite was found along Collier St., Pulaski 7-13 Sep (BL, ph. m. obs.), with a **Mississippi Kite** joining it on 7 Sep (ph. PL, m. obs.). Additionally, singles were recorded at Harvey's Knob, Bedford/Botetourt 25 Aug, 14 Sep and 18 Sep (m. obs.). At Rockfish Gap, Augusta singles were recorded 20 Aug, 3 Sep and 6 Sep (m. obs.). On 5 Sep one was at Stuart's Draft, Augusta (ph. AD); on 11 Sep one was in Staunton (ph. MK); and one was at Hillandale Pk., Harrisonburg 6 Oct (RC). It was a decent fall for Northern Goshawk, with reports of singles 18 Sep (VL, m. obs.) and 8 Oct (GM) at Rockfish Gap, Augusta; 30 Sep at Heritage Pk., Montgomery (ph. MN, WB); 30 Oct at Harvey's Knob, Bedford/Botetourt (BE); and 8 Nov at Snickers Gap, Clarke. A SWAINSON'S **HAWK** was reported at Rockfish Gap, Augusta 19 Aug (GM, VL). A light morph Rough-legged Hawk spent nearly a month at Rockfish Gap, Augusta from 7-28 Nov (ph. VL, m. obs.), occasionally straying into adjacent Nelson and Albemarle. Up to 3 Short-eared Owls were at Bell's Ln., Staunton 7-9 Nov (AL, m. obs.); 4 were also flushed on 14 Nov along Poorhouse Rd., Frederick (SM). Single Northern Saw-whet Owls were recorded at the Highland Retreat banding site, Rockingham from 3-28 Nov (ph. MG, m. obs.); Rawley Springs, Rockingham 30 Sep, 13 Oct and 10 Nov (LB); Caldwell Fields, Montgomery 17 Nov (XG), and Beagle Gap, Augusta 26 Nov (MN). Two were on Pandapas FS Rd., Montgomery 20 Nov (ph. JG, et al.).

FLYCATCHERS — DICKCISSELS

As is typical in fall, there were multiple reports of Olive-sided Flycatcher from 11 counties and cities: Frederick, Clarke, Warren, Rockingham, Augusta, Bath, Botetourt, Roanoke, Craig, and Yellow-bellied Montgomery, Salem. **Flycatchers** were only seen in six: *Frederick*, Page, Augusta, Rockbridge, Botetourt, and Montgomery. An Alder Flycatcher was at the Vet School Pond 6 Sep (LA, ph. MN). It was a very poor fall for Loggerhead Shrike in the Region; aside from several reports in *Pulaski*, the only other report came from near Hinton, Rockingham on 4 Oct (LB). A flock of 60 Bank Swallows at Parrot River Rd., Pulaski 16 Aug (LA) was a notable count for the Region. As usual, most Brown-headed Nuthatch reports came from the small population in the Roanoke area, but two records from *Montgomery* on 7 Nov were more notable – two were on Flatwoods Rd. (LA, m. obs.), and one was on Peppers Ferry Rd. (ID). There were a few reports of **Black-capped** Chickadee at lower elevations this fall, including some in Montgomery, Botetourt and Frederick. There were several reports of Marsh Wren: single birds were at the Vet School Pond 19 Sep (LA); VT Airport 11 Oct (DW); near Silver L., Rockingham 5 and 11 Oct (HJ, LY, et al.); and at Blandy 30 Sep and 4 Oct (ph. BP). The incursion of Evening Grosbeaks into the Region was the largest in many years. There were too many records to list all of them here, but the high count for the Region was an impressive 95 at the Cool Spring Battlefield, Clarke 15 Nov (FA). A Common Redpoll was in Christiansburg, Montgomery 16 Nov (ph. JMc). There was a bit of an irruption of Red Crossbills outside of their typical range, with a number of records throughout Shenandoah NP as well as in the Fort Valley, Shenandoah and at lower elevation in Montgomery near Blacksburg. Two Lark **Sparrows** were at Leonard's Pond, *Rockingham* 7 Sep (HJ). There were a few Clay-colored **Sparrows** around, with reports of single birds from Seven Bends SP, Shenandoah 25 Oct (DGe); Singers Glen, Rockingham 7 Nov (CT);

and Rockfish Gap, Augusta 15 Oct (GM, VL). The only record of **American Tree Sparrow** was one at Blandy 21 Nov (EM, et al.), signaling this species' remarkable decline in recent years. A Prothonotary Warbler was at the Vet School Pond 7 Sep (TD). There were several reports of **Orange-crowned** Warbler this Montgomery had the most records, with one at the Vet School Pond 12 Oct (ph. LA, et al.); 2 at the VT Airport 17 Oct (ph. JG); and one at Heritage Pk. 19-20 Oct (ph. LA). Other reports were one at Rte. 610, Augusta 20 Sep (GM); one at Hensley's Pond, Rockingham 22 Sep (HM); one at Locust Grove Farm, Rockbridge 10 Oct (Gordon Brown); and one at Natural Bridge, Rockbridge 17 Oct (MS). It was a decent fall for Connecticut Warbler, with records coming from five jurisdictions: Clarke, Rockingham, Rockbridge and Roanoke Augusta, Mourning Warbler reports came from five well: Clarke, Rockingham, locales as Harrisonburg, Augusta, and Montgomery. A few Dickcissels were around, with records coming from Clarke, Rockingham and several from *Montgomery*. Perhaps the most notable were 2 at Sinking Cr. Pastures, *Craig* 19 Aug (KG).

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SOUTHWEST



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Bland, Buchanan, Carroll, Dickenson, Floyd, Grayson, Lee, Russell, Scott, Smyth, Tazewell, Washington, Wise, and Wythe counties; the cities of Bristol, Galax, and Norton.

Average temperatures across the Region were in line with expectations, but this is where climatic normalcy ended. Precipitation was above average, in large part due to the active hurricane season. Many of the hurricanes made their way up through the center of the country and drifted eastward into Virginia. This led to an increase in tern numbers on the Tennessee side of South Holsten Lake and possibly an increase in wader abundance throughout the region. The aboveaverage rainfall and resulting high waters may also have contributed to the limited number of shorebirds reports this fall. Later in the season, the region experienced above average waterfowl numbers. I would be remiss without mentioning the finch super flight that occurred at the end of the season. Early records for Purple Finch and Pine Siskin were noted across the Region and southwest Virginia got in on the Evening Grosbeak action with a few records in Buchanan, Tazewell, and Wythe.

WATERFOWL — OWLS

One **Snow Goose** was seen at Clear Creek L., *Bristol* 22 Nov (CL). The usually duckless lake at BIP, *Dickenson* produced a hefty waterfowl list 12 Nov, including 2 **Mute Swans**, 17 **Wood Ducks**, 3 **Gadwalls**, 7 **Mallards**, 3 **Redheads**, 18 **Ring-necked Ducks**, 3 **Greater Scaup**, 15

Lesser Scaup, one Red-breasted Merganser, and 4 Ruddy Ducks (DR). Virginia Rails were reported on a few occasions this fall and followed a trend of increasing reports for the species in the Region. Up to 2 were seen at the Saltville Ponds, Smyth 9 Aug-26 Oct (AG, a. r. DT, m. obs.); one bird was heard calling at Clifton Farm Rd., Tazewell 24 Aug (CD); and an astounding 5 birds were heard calling in wetlands on Rocky Fork Rd., Wise 11 Nov (WB, MN). A single Sandhill Crane was seen at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 28 Oct (ph. AB). Shorebird numbers were few and far between in the southwest this year, and the only noteworthy sightings came from two separate Greater Yellowlegs reports. One was seen at Southern Gap, Buchanan 16 Oct (m. obs.) and the other report came, unsurprisingly, from the Saltville Ponds, Smyth 8 Nov (ph. AB, MP). Common Loon reports came in from John W. Flanagan Res., Dickenson 13 Nov (DR) and from Cavitt's Creek Pk., Tazewell 22 Nov. Many Great Egrets were seen across the Region in the months of August and September, with reports from 5 counties: Buchanan, Tazewell, Russell, Smyth, and Wythe. A total of three Blackcrowned Night-Herons were observed across two separate reports, with one bird at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 13 Oct (ph. PE), and a juv. and ad. observed at Clear Creek L., Bristol 21 Nov (ph. KC). One ad. Mississippi Kite was documented at Britt's Pk., Tazewell 12 Sep (CD). Per usual several Golden Eagles were detected: one ad. was seen at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 2 Sep (DS) and 19 Oct (JP), and an imm. bird was seen at Leeman Pk., Lee 13 Oct (CF). Two juv.

Barn Owls were seen in a nest box off of Old Saltworks Rd., *Washington* 16 Aug (ph. AN), and another was heard calling at Burke's Garden, *Tazewell* 24 Nov (DS). A deceased **Long-eared** Owl was found lying on the road at Burke's Garden, *Tazewell* 14 Nov (ph. AB, MP). This fall was a bumper season for **Northern Saw-whet** Owls; one was heard calling in response to playback at Whitetop Mt., *Grayson* 11 Oct (m. obs.), and another was heard by the same birding group at High Knob, *Scott* 17 Oct (m. obs.).

FALCONS — WARBLERS

Peregrine Falcons were observed on three separate occasions across the region. One bird was seen at Lovill's Cr. Boat Ramp, Carroll 2 & 5 Oct (DJ, ph. CJ), and one at BIP, Dickenson 14 Oct (CF) and was most likely a bird that bred there. Another report came from White Rocks Rd., Lee 25 Oct (LG). Many Loggerhead Shrikes were seen across the southwestern portion of the state and seem to have been reported in higher numbers than in previous years. The first report of the period came off of Citizen Rd., Wythe 28 Sep (AB), followed by one on Rocky Hollow Rd., Grayson 4 Oct (ph. AB). Another bird was seen at the well-known shrike spot of Elk Garden, Russell 17 Oct (ph. LA, ph. JW, m. obs.) & 20 Nov (WB, ph. MN); one was on Wilson Hill Rd., Lee 18 Oct (LG) & 4 Nov (DK, JK); and lastly the resident shrike at Burke's Garden, Tazewell was reported 9 Sep (ph. DS), Nov 16 (LR), & 26 Nov (JP). A single Whiteeyed Vireo was seen at Falls Mill L., Tazewell 23 Oct (ph. CD) and is the second latest record of the species for the Region. Three reports of Philadelphia Vireo came during the period, including 2 at Compton Mt. Rd., Buchanan 20 Sep (ph. RM); Upper Poore Valley, Smyth 23 Sep (VF); and Riverstone Organic Farm, Floyd 3 Oct (SC). Along with the many finches, Redbreasted Nuthatches came down in force this season. The first confirmed report that did not come from a resident bird was 9 Sep at Fancy Gap, Carroll (WC). House Wrens seem to be

wintering across the state in higher numbers than usual and southwestern Virginia got in on the action with a single bird seen at Southern Gap, Buchanan from 31 Oct (ph. DO) to 21 Nov (WB, MN). Three Marsh Wrens – noteworthy for the Region and a difficult detection for this skulky bird – were detected: at Falls Mill L., Tazewell 2 Oct (CD); Southern Gap, Buchanan, 3 Oct (ph. DO); and Burke's Garden, Tazewell 12 Oct (CF). Across the state, the star bird this season has perhaps been Evening Grosbeak, which have been moving southward in massive numbers not seen since the 1990s. Up to 11 were seen at Compton Mt. Rd., Buchanan 2-30 Nov (ph. RM); 2 at Burke's Garden, *Tazewell* 5-8 Nov (DS, ph. HS); 10 on Ward Branch Rd., Wythe 19 Nov (NC); and a flyover bird at Southern Gap, Buchanan 21 Nov (WB, ph. MN). Purple Finches and Pine Siskins were among the many species that came down in force this fall, and the first records for these finches respectively came in late September and early October. Lincoln's Sparrow were numerous, and one was seen at Burrus Tract, Bland 24 Sep (KG); another at Saltville Ponds, Smyth 10 Oct (KE); 2 at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 12 Oct (CF); one at Leeman Pk., Lee 13 Oct (CF); BIP, Dickenson 14 Oct (CF); one at BRMC, Carroll 17 Oct (CJ); another at Compton Mt., Buchanan 24 Oct (ph. RM); one at Happy Hollow Rd., Buchanan 24 Oct (DO); one in Grayson 25 Oct (MG); and lastly one at Rural Retreat L., Wythe 28 Oct (ph. AB). A Black-and-white Warbler was seen at the Skull's Gap Overlook, Smyth 24 Oct (AA) and represents the latest sighting of the species on record in the Region. Several Tennessee Warblers were detected fairly late into the season, with the latest being seen in Lee 9 Nov (PG). This also represents the late-date record for this species in this Region. A few Orangecrowned Warblers were observed in southwest Virginia this fall: one was at Falls Mill L., Tazewell 16 Oct (ph. CD), and another 2 were seen at Compton Mt., Buchanan 20 Oct (ph. RM). This fall was exceptional for Connecticut Warblers across the state and this Region managed one record from the Burrus Tract, *Bland* 24 Sep (ph. KG).

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CENTRAL



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Albemarle, Amherst, Bedford, Campbell, Caroline, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Hanover, Louisa, Nelson, Orange, Powhatan, and Spotsylvania counties; the cities of Charlottesville, Fredericksburg and Lynchburg.

The fall of 2020 was one of the most exciting seasons of birding in some time. Despite this, the season started off slow with a rather lackluster showing for wading birds due to flooded lakes and wet conditions further south. Things picked up quickly, however, with storm systems and tropical storm remnants causing widespread displacement of shorebirds, terns, and gulls. Neotropical passerine migrants were diverse and abundant, with many prize species encountered in shocking densities. Raptor and waterfowl migration also delivered surprises to attentive observers. However, the real stars of the Fall were certainly the irruptive boreal passerines that reached the Region in record numbers. Redbreasted Nuthatches, Pine Siskins and Purple Finches quickly became a few of the most abundant species in the entire Region by early October, and continued their onslaught through the end of the fall reporting period. Evening Grosbeaks stole the show in November and graced many bird feeders with their beautiful and raucous flocks. Highlight species were plentiful, and included Ross's Goose, Red-necked Grebe, Surf Scoter, American Avocet, Willet, Brown Pelican, Swallow-tailed Kite, Rough-legged Hawk, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Olive-sided and Yellow-bellied Flycatchers, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Sedge Wren, Evening Grosbeak, Purple Finch, Red Crossbill, Pine Siskin, Nelson's Sparrow, and Golden-winged, Connecticut, and Mourning Warblers.

GEESE — IBISES

Two Snow Geese were reported: a blue morph at James River Rd., Albemarle 19 Nov (ph. BB, TB), and a white morph at London Downs, Bedford 21 & 22 Nov (AE, ph. m. obs). Generally more uncommon than Snow, two Ross's Geese were discovered at Thrashers Mill Pk., Amherst 26 Nov (KH). Three Surf Scoters were found during a rainstorm at L. Monticello, Fluvanna 12 Nov (ph. ST). Providing a very uncommon fall record for this species, a Rednecked Grebe was at L. Anna, Spotsylvania 13 Nov (ph. DN). Up to two Ruby-throated **Hummingbirds** continued at a feeder through the end of the fall period on Bolling Ave., Charlottesville 19 Nov (LT). Late fall and winter hummingbirds have been on the increase with milder climes and fewer cold snaps. Always very rare in the Region, an American Avocet at Woodvale Farm, Albemarle delighted local birders 5 & 6 Aug (ph. WC, m. obs.). A displaced Willet was found during a storm system at Rockfish Valley Elementary, Nelson 1 Sep (ph. ES, TS). Rare in the Piedmont portion of the region, a Laughing Gull was at L. Anna, Louisa 29 Aug (ph. AR). The lone **Black Tern** report came from Mill Creek 29 Aug (ph. MB, MJ) during the passage of Tropical Storm Laura. Tropical Storm Isais deposited 4 Common Terns at L. Anna, Louisa 4 Aug (ph. AR). One of the most bizarre reports of the season was 3 **BROWN PELICANS** soaring over Gordonsville, Orange 5 Aug (TD), far removed from any significant water body. The passage of Tropical Storm Isais the day prior offers a possible explanation. A scarce and skulky transient, an **American Bittern** 25 Oct at Rockfish Valley Trail, *Nelson* (ph. ES, TS) was the sole report in the Region this fall. **Little Blue Herons** were not widely reported compared to previous years: one was at Mill Creek 31 Aug (MJ) and six were at L. Hanover Nature Trail, *Hanover* (ph. NC); at least one lingered there until 13 Sep. **White Ibis** reports were similarly lacking; one at Sandiges Rd., *Amherst* 1 Sep (ph. MH) was later seen at Mill Creek 18 Sep, and another was at Slaughter Pen Historic Site, *Spotsylvania* 14 Sep (JG).

KITES — WRENS

Always a thrilling visitor to the Region, there were an outstanding 4 Swallow-tailed Kites found. The first was at Bowling Green, Caroline 1 Aug (ph. MC, m. obs) and lingered there until 6 Aug; another was also seen 1 Aug at nearby Sorrell Ln., Caroline (BF). The next was found on Lovers Ln., Orange 4 Aug (ph. BB, MNoo) subsequently detected in bordering Albemarle and Louisa in the immediate vicinity thru 6 Aug. The final report came from Thrashers Lake Pk., Amherst 28 Aug (ph. MB). Migrant Golden Eagles were spotted at L. Monacan, Nelson 3 Nov (ph. ES, TS) and over Crozet, Albemarle (CB) 8 Nov. A now annual fall migrant through the region, Mississippi Kites were observed at Bland Wade Ln., Nelson 5 Sep (ph. ES, TS, GS) and near Holly Hill, Powhatan 9 Sep (KC). A light morph imm. Rough-legged Hawk first observed from Rockfish Gap Hawkwatch was present in Nelson and Albemarle counties over I-64 on 7 – 28 Nov (ph. m. obs), and showed beautifully for many birders from both the hawkwatch and the Flight of the Albatross Scenic Overlook, Nelson throughout its stay. Northern Saw-whet Owls were detected in the Albemarle portion of Shenandoah NP at Sawmill Run Overlook 19 Nov (BB), and Beagle Gap and Blackrock 26 Nov (a. r. AE). One was also at Camp Hydaway, Campbell 13 Nov (MJ). There were at least 12 Olive-sided Flycatchers

reported between Albemarle. Amherst. Charlottesville, and Nelson. Three Yellowbellied Flycatchers were encountered: one at Observatory Mt., Albemarle 19 Aug (ph. a. r. BB); at Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 1 Sep (ph. TB); and Pen Pk., Charlottesville 18 Sep (ph. TB). A 26 Oct Least Flycatcher was exceptionally late at Old Trail, Albemarle (ph. BB, MNor). Red-breasted Nuthatches had a major invasion into the Region this fall; the earliest report came from Montebello, Nelson 18 Aug (ES, TS). Blue-grey Gnatcatcher is typically one of our earliest migrants, making one at Dunlora, Albemarle 18 Oct (ph. BB, DC) exceptionally late. House Wrens lingered quite late this year as well, with six reported into Nov. A Sedge Wren was a very surprising early fall discovery at Dunlora, Albemarle 22 Aug (ph. DC), possibly part of a more widespread movement into the Mid-Atlantic around this time. Marsh Wrens were detected at several traditional locations, but an early bird at Peaks of Otter, Bedford 9 Sep (BE) was unusual.

FINCHES — DICKCISSEL

The finch irruption of Fall 2020 was one for the record books. Thousands of Pine Siskins and Purple Finches flooded far s. of their boreal strongholds, and later came Evening Grosbeaks in numbers that exceeded the wildest dreams of all but the most seasoned birders. No doubt the flagship species of this fall for many, the grosbeak invasion in the Region saw the largest numbers of this species in three decades. This charismatic boreal wanderer was detected in Albemarle. Amherst. Bedford. Campbell. Charlottesville, Fluvanna, Hanover, Louisa, Lynchburg, Nelson and Powhatan, and surely occurred throughout the Region. The extrema of these reports included an early bird at Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 31 Oct (a. r. DC) and the high count of 35 at Warren Ferry, Albemarle 29 Nov (ph. BK). Purple Finches had a massive movement into the Region, with the earliest arrival coming from Chancho Volante, Albemarle

15 Sep (PM) and the high count of 112 from Dunlora, *Albemarle* 18 Oct (ph. BB, DC). **Red Crossbills** continued in the Montebello area of *Nelson*; 5 were noted 1 Sep (ph. DB), and 2 on 15 & 21 Sep (ph. DC, ES). These may have been precursors to a larger movement that occurred later in the fall in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic regions. **Pine Siskins** swarmed across the region as well, with a record early date of 4 Aug on Radar Rd, *Bedford* (AP) and the high count of 200 from Byrd Grove, *Fluvanna* 20 Oct (ph. SH, WH, NT).

Providing one of extremely few fall records of this rare Regional migrant, a Nelson's Sparrow was at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 2 & 6 Oct (ph. BB). Eleven Lincoln's Sparrows at Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 14 Oct (ph. TB) was a high count for this generally uncommon species. A lingerer on 17 Oct provided a late date for Wormeating Warbler at Rockfish Valley Trail, Nelson (ph. RW). Only 3 Golden-winged Warblers were found: one at Rockfish Valley Trail, Nelson 27 Aug (ph. ES, TS); another at Ivy Cr. Natural Area, Albemarle 8 Sep (ph. BB, m. obs) that lingered there through 13 Sep; and one at Billingsgate, Bedford 30 Sep (KL). Notably, 2 Brewster's Warblers (Golden-winged x Bluewinged Warbler) were found: one at Pleasant Grove Pk., Fluvanna 3 Sep (TB) and another at Ivy Cr. Natural Area, Albemarle 6 Sep (ph. TB, DC). Among multiple late Tennessee Warbler reports, one 10 Nov at Riverview Pk., Charlottesville (ph. BB, TB) was the latest. Eleven **Orange-crowned Warblers**

reported, above average for this uncommon late season migrant. A scarce and secretive migrant which averages only a couple reports per season, there were a staggering 13 Connecticut Warblers reported between 3 Sep and 25 Oct from Albemarle, Bedford, Fluvanna, Hanover, and Nelson. Averaging only slightly more common than Connecticut, there were also 13 individual reports of Mourning Warbler from Albemarle, Charlottesville, and Nelson; two very late individuals on 17 Oct in Albemarle were exceptional. A Blackpoll Warbler 10 Nov at Riverview Pk., Charlottesville (ph. BB, TB) was the last report of this late fall migrant. A Northern Parula was exceptionally late at Lickinghole Cr., Albemarle 19 Nov (ph. MF). The lone Dickcissel report of the period came from Old Trail, *Albemarle* 26 Sep (ph. KK)

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SOUTHEAST



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Charles City, Chesterfield, Henrico, Isle of Wight, James City, New Kent, Prince George, Southampton, Surry, Sussex, and York counties; the cities of Franklin, Hopewell, Richmond, and Williamsburg.

On average, temperatures were slightly above normal for the four-month period but there were no marked deviations from normal averages in any individual month. Precipitation, on the other hand, was a different story with increases above normal for each month. August precipitation amounts reached 15.34 inches, which was 10.68 inches above normal – the second wettest August on record. This amount of rain in August had dire implications for available shorebird habitat at Hog Island WMA and, consequently, this resulted in one of the most abysmal shorebird seasons there in recent memory. Fall passerine migration continued the trend of the past several years towards later departure dates for many species, with new late dates for several species. It may be time to start rewriting the average departure dates for many of these species. It was an exciting season for rarities in the region, including Piping Plover, Hudsonian Godwit, Sooty Tern, Swallow-tailed Kite, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Cave Swallow, Yellow-headed Blackbird and Black-throated Gray Warbler.

GEESE — SKIMMERS

A single **Ross's Goose** was noted in the Brandon area of *Prince George* 16 Nov (ph. ABr). Potentially the same bird was seen again just across the river at the Sandy Point area of *Charles City* 21 Nov (ph. ABr). At least five "Richardson's" **Cackling Geese** were tallied among a large flock of **Canada Geese** in the Brandon area of *Prince George* 9 Nov (ABr). Two f. **Surf Scoters** were present on Swift Cr. Res. at The Boathouse at Sunday Pk., *Chesterfield* 21-29 Nov (m. obs.). A f. **White-**

winged Scoter was found at Swift Cr. Res., Chesterfield 3 Nov (ph. MC). The bird continued until 13 Nov (m. obs.). An ad. m. Long-tailed Duck was spotted at the Huguenot Flatwater section of JRP 2 Nov and remained there throughout the day (ph. JD, m. obs). Late Yellow-billed Cuckoos included one in Toano, James City 31 Oct & 2 Nov (ph. CA) and one at William & Mary, City of Williamsburg 13 Nov (AR). Black-billed Cuckoo reports included one

spotted in a residential yard in City of Richmond 3 Oct (E&BO). The other was photographed at Bryan Pk., City of Richmond 9 Oct (BG). Two **Common Gallinules** were at Shirley 14 Nov (ph. ABr), while a single bird was still there 25 Nov (ph. ABr). A molting ad. American Golden-**Plover** was at Riverside Turf Farm, Charles City 10 Sep (ph. EW) and remained through 12 Sep (m. obs.) A juv. American Golden-Plover was seen at the same location 18 Sep (ph. AR). A PIPING PLOVER was a good find at Felgates Cr., York 28 Aug, providing the 7th or 8th local record (CM, NN, AR). Two HUDSONIAN **GODWITS** spent the day on Turkey Island Rd.. Henrico 30 Oct (ph. ABr, EO, KH). A Whiterumped Sandpiper at Mainland Farm, James City 2-9 Nov, was the first local Nov record (ph. BW). A **Buff-breasted Sandpiper** was at Riverside Turf Farm, Charles City 28-31 Aug (m. obs.). Late Solitary Sandpipers included one at Mainland Farm, James City 20-23 Oct (ph. BW). Unfortunately, this bird was found recently deceased from head trauma on 23 Oct. A second Solitary Sandpiper replaced the dead bird at Mainland Farm and was present from 28 Oct-1 Nov, providing a new local late date (ph. BW). At least two but possibly four SOOTY TERNS were observed on the James R. from Lawrence Lewis Jr. Pk., Charles City during the passage of Tropical Storm Isaias 4 Aug (ph. EO, ph. AB). Late for the region, a Royal Tern was at Jamestown, James City 4 Nov (BW). Not usually seen this far inland, a Sandwich Tern was at Wall's Bluff, Isle of Wight 8 Sep (TC). Two Black Skimmers were noted at Fort Boykin Historic Pk., Isle of Wight 24 Aug (TC).

PELICANS — THRUSHES

More and more American White Pelicans are finding Hog to be suitable fall/winter habitat – 104 birds there on 22 Nov set a new local peak count (ph. CH, SK). A lone American White Pelican was at Swift Cr. Res., *Chesterfield* 11-12 Oct (ph. L<, m. obs.). Single juv. White Ibis, prone to post-breeding inland wandering, were found at Fort Boykin Historic Pk. 6 Aug (TC) and at the Reedy Cr. section of JRP 27-28 Aug (m.

obs.). A **SWALLOW-TAILED KITE** passed over Kingswood, *James City* 13 Sep (BT), marking the 7th local record and first fall record. In recent years, this species is becoming more prevalent in the region as well as in the state overall. A **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker** was at Hog 20 Sep (LL), setting a new local early date. An **ASH-THROATED FLYCATCHER** was photographed at Dutch Gap/Henricus by an Anonymous eBirder 10 Nov. The bird was

spotted again 14 Nov (ph. MK) and continued to be seen off and on through 21 Nov (m. obs.). Two Yellow-bellied Flycatchers were reported in the region this fall. The first was at the Wetlands section of JRP 27 Aug (WT), while the second was photographed at Ancarrow's 30 Sep (ph. AB). A Least Flycatcher at Basset Hall Nature Trail, Williamsburg 7 Sep (ph. CM) provided the 8th local record. Three other Least Flycatchers were reported in the region, at Harrison L. National Fish Hatchery, Charles City 22 Aug (MC); at Ancarrow's 19 Sep (ph. AB, ph. LB); and at Deep Run Pk., Henrico 30 Sep (ph. EF). A Warbling Vireo, somewhat rare in the eastern part of the region, was at the Jamestown Glasshouse, James City 2 Sep (ph. NB). A Northern Rough-winged Swallow at Mainland Farm, James City 17 Oct set a new local late date (AR). A CAVE SWALLOW was discovered on a utility wire in the Brandon area of Prince George 19 Nov (ph. ABr). A large irruption of Red-breasted Nuthatches occurred throughout the state this fall. The earliest bird recorded in the region was one in Chesterfield 31 Aug (AB). Away from Ancarrow's, where the species is

known to winter, the latest **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** in the region was one at Shore Dr., *James City* 27 Nov (M&RF). A late **Veery** was at Tormentor L., *Isle of Wight* 5 Oct (ph. TC). A **Gray-cheeked Thrush** was in Colonial Heritage, *James City* 25 Oct (ph. SD), a new local late date. Conversely, a **Hermit Thrush** at York R. SP, *James City* 19 Sep set a new local early date (M&LB).

GROSBEAKS — DICKCISSEL

A large irruption of Evening Grosbeaks got underway in the region in late Nov. Birds were spotted throughout the region with the largest concentration noted at the Pony Pasture section of JRP, where upwards of 30 birds were counted (m. obs.). A Lark Sparrow was found at Jamestown Is., James City 11 Sep (RS), furnishing a 7th local record; the bird continued into the next day (ph. NB). An imm. White-crowned Sparrow was at Jamestown Beach Event Pk., James City 23 Oct (ph. BW) and 26 Oct (BT). Seven Nelson's Sparrows at Bay Tree Beach Rd., York 20 Oct set a new local peak count (DY). A late Yellowbreasted Chat lingered at Shirley until at least 19 Nov (ph. ABr). An ad. m. YELLOW-HEADED BLACKBIRD was gleaned from an enormous mixed blackbird flock at Chippokes Plantation SP, Surry 29 Nov (NB, KL). A very late Bobolink photographed at was Dutch Gap/Henricus 14 Nov (ph. JE). A Northern Watertrush was in Governor's Land, James City 25-30 Oct, setting a new local late date (ph. CO). A Tennessee Warbler in Toano, James City 4 Nov also set a new local late date (ph. CA). Connecticut Warblers encountered in the region this fall included one at the Wetlands section of JRP 15-16 Sep (WT, KL, PB, NW); one at Rockwood Pk., Chesterfield 26 Sep (ph. MC); and one at Ancarrow's 28 Sep (JD). A Hooded Warbler at New Quarter Pk., York 24 Oct set another new local late date (JL). A late American Redstart was at Chimborazo Pk., City of Richmond 10 Nov (PB). A late Cape May Warbler was at City Point 4 Nov (ph. ABr). A Northern Parula was at Shore Dr., James City 21-22 Nov, establishing a new local late date

(DC, ph. BW, m. obs.). A very late **Yellow Warbler** was seen at Ancarrow's 24 Oct (PB, MS). Two late **Yellow-throated Warblers** were at Dutch Gap/Henricus 5 Oct (ph. BWo). A **BLACK-THROATED GRAY WARBLER** was discovered on Shore Dr., *James City* 20 Nov (ph. DC) and remained in the area until 29 Nov (m. obs.). This was the second local record of this species, the first coming in late Dec 2017. A very late **Blue Grosbeak** was photographed at Dutch

Gap/Henricus 13 Nov (ph. BWo). **Dickcissel** reports included a single bird at Jamestown Beach Event Pk., *James City* 2 Oct (ph. BW, ph. AR, FR, JW). This was a 12th local record. The other report, of two flyovers, came from Cumberland Marsh Preserve, *New Kent* 4 Oct (AR).

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COASTAL



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Accomack and Northampton counties; the cities of Chesapeake, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Poquoson, Portsmouth, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach.

Superlatives such as amazing, unprecedented, extraordinary, OMG!, What's next!? (and there were nexts!!), characterizing fall 2020 birding understate the season's bird diversity, and for some taxa, abundance. The Region claimed six first-state-record species (pending VARCOM deliberations): two trans-Atlantic vagrants (European Storm-Petrel and Gray Heron); three southwestern US strays (Couch's Kingbird, Brown-crested Flycatcher, and Warbler); and a southern Atlantic displacement (Masked Booby). Aug, Oct and Nov pelagic trips served up Brown Noddy, Yellow-nosed Albatross, Black-capped Petrel, and White-faced reports. Storm-Petrel Black-chinned Hummingbird, Black Rail, Franklin's Gull, Roseate Tern, Brown Booby, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Black-whiskered Vireo, and Townsend's Warbler headlined additional species that set birder-mobiles to chase mode. As forecasted. there was a Red-breasted Nuthatch/northern finch flight set in motion by boreal forest cone-crop shortage. What roles did seasonally above average temperatures, monthly above average rainfall ending 30 Nov 8.50 in. above normal for the year, 30 Atlantic Basin tropical system events, and record-setting wildfires in the southwestern US play in this rarities surfeit? Exuberant joy among the birds, ESB.

Accomack); Craney (Craney Island Dredged Material Management Area, Portsmouth); CVWO (Coastal Virginia Wildlife Observatory); ESVNWR (Eastern Shore of Virginia NWR, Northampton); False Cape (False Cape SP, Virginia Beach); First Landing (First Landing SP, Virginia Beach); Grandview (Grandview Nature Preserve, Hampton); HRBT (Hampton Roads Tunnel, *Hampton/Norfolk*); Bridge **KHW** (Kiptopeke Hawk Watch at KSP); KSP (Kiptopeke SP, Northampton); Little Is. (Little Island Pk., Virginia Beach); Magothy Bay (Magothy Bay NAP, Northampton); NNP (Newport News Pk., Newport News); Rudee (Rudee Inlet, Virginia Beach); Savage Neck (Savage Neck Dunes NAP, Northampton); Sunset (Sunset Beach Resort, *Northampton*)

WATERFOWL — SHOREBIRDS

Two **Snow Geese** at Chinc. 27 Sep (ph. SSt, JSt, ZSt) were well ahead of the species' 30 Oct average arrival date. Single Ross's Geese, now late autumn regulars in the Region, were over KSP 14 Nov (ph. ThS) and at Chinc. 21 Nov into Dec (m. obs.). A Eurasian Wigeon at Chinc. 29 Nov (AH, EO, CW) barely squeezed into the season's report window. Early arriving Aythya included a Redhead at Chinc. 8 Oct (DP) and a Ring-necked Duck at Mt. Trashmore Pk., Virginia Beach 15 Sep (ph. LR, ph. RR); 15 Oct is the expected arrival for both. A f. King Eider was an 8 Oct Grandview surprise (ph. JMc); another at 14th St., Virginia Beach 20 Nov (ph. AB, CFa, ph. SM, ph. JMc) was probably the one noted at Rudee into Dec (m. obs.). Common **Eiders** were listed from numerous sites 31 Oct through season's end with a peak of 6 at Chinc. 22 Nov (KBa). A m. Harlequin Duck passed Little Is. 31 Oct (AB). Other singles were near Lynnhaven, Virginia Beach 26 Nov (ph. AB, ph. RBi, ph. SK, ph. JMc) and at Beach Pier Gift Shop/Fishing Pier, Virginia Beach 28 Nov (KSu, CT). A Red-necked Grebe at First Landing 8 Oct (LR) bested the species' 25 Oct Gold Book Coastal Plain extreme early date by seventeen days. An Eared Grebe was at Back Bay 24 Sep (ph. DC, ph. RBi, AB, RR). A White-winged **Dove** was a one-day specialty for Cape Charles 17 Aug (ph. MA, EC). A Yellow-billed Cuckoo at Sunnyside Village, Northampton (MA) marked the third consecutive year this species was last reported on 11 Nov. Single Black-billed Cuckoos were eBird-entered as follows: at Back Bay 23 Sep (ph. RBi, TM), at KSP (KBa et al.) and the ESVNWR (BA, DC, ph. LM) 3 Oct; at KSP 8 Oct (ESB); and Savage Neck 9 Oct (MP). For a second consecutive fall, KSP feeders enticed **BLACK-CHINNED HUMMINGBIRD**, this year an imm. 8 (ph. MA, ph. DN, m. obs.) & 9 (ph. RK, KBa et al.) Oct. Numerous Ruby-throated Hummingbirds were chronicled throughout the Region into December. A Selasphorus rufous/sasin hummingbird that had "been hanging out for a few days" at a Norfolk home was last seen 29 Nov (ph. CHa). A BLACK RAIL closely observed on the ground and in flight at Chinc. 24 Nov (AR) provided hope this seriously declining species has retained a foothold in the Commonwealth. Single Common Gallinules were at Back Bay 5 Oct (ESB, ph. CH) and the NCP 17 Oct (m. obs.). Four Sandhill Cranes were seen in lower Northampton 3 Nov (JG, ML, ph. BT). The Black-necked Stilt peak count of 97 at Craney 20 Aug (AM, LS, BT, BW, DY) included ads. with young hatched at the facility during the summer. The maximum reported total from the Queens Sound Channel, Accomack/Chinc. area was 6 on 6 Aug (Anonymous). Craney had the highest reported American Avocet total with 523 on 24 Sep (AM, LS, BW, DY). Elsewhere, 2 at Chinc. 7-24 Aug (ph. JL, m. obs.) preceded one to 3 there 16 Oct-13 Nov (ph. JL). Singles were

at Willis Wharf, Northampton 2-28 Nov (m. obs.) and Back Bay 5 Nov (ph. SM); 2 were at the NCP 14 Nov (ph. m. obs.). Among many 18 Sep-17 Nov American Golden-Plover observations was a high count of 22 off Seaview Dr., Northampton 13 Nov (NN). A late-departing **Piping Plover** was at Grandview 9-28 Nov (ph. m. obs.); this species' average late date is 15 Oct. Two Longbilled Curlew reports placed one at Gull Marsh. Northampton 22 Oct (ph. ES, ph. KL, WT) and one on FINWR 13 Nov ph. (NN). This species last reported in the Region Wachapreague, Accomack 16 Aug 2017 (ph. ESB, BA, JP, BK). A Hudsonian Godwit was listed at Back Bay 24 Sep (BA, LMo) through 5 Oct (ESB, CH). Another was at Chinc. 9 Oct (ph. JL) and one was off Seaview Dr., Northampton 13 Nov (ph. MA, ph. TD, IT). One to 4 Buffbreasted Sandpipers frequented Craney 20 Aug (AM, LS, BT) to 3 Sep (AM, LS, ph. BW, DY). Up to 2 were at Chinc. 29 Aug (ph. JMc) to 2 Sep (v.r. BH) and one was near Ocean Lakes Pk., Virginia Beach 10 Sep (ph. AB). The Whiterumped Sandpiper average late date is 7 Nov. Thus, one at Quinby, Accomack 14 Nov (ph. TS, DS, ES) was noteworthy. Thirty-six Long-billed **Dowitchers** were reported 15 Nov, 35 at Messick Pt., Poquoson (ph. JGi, AR, HW) and one at Beasley (AB, JMc). A Spotted Sandpiper was at a "small lake" in Virginia Beach 14 Nov (ph. RC); on average this species departs by 15 Oct. Adding data for clarifying each subspecies' seasonal distributions was a FOS Western Willet report, 3 at False Cape 1 Aug (SM), and a last-ofseason Eastern Willet report, one at Chinc. 25 Sep (LA, AW). Wilson's Phalaropes were documented 10 Aug-9 Oct; peak counts were 9 at Craney 27 Aug (AM, LS, BW, DY) and 7 at Chinc. 28 Aug (ph. JL). Red-necked Phalarope sightings fit a comparable date range, 9 Aug-10 Oct. Noteworthy totals were 9-12 at Craney 27 Aug to 1 Oct (ph. BW et al.), 6 off Northampton 30 Aug (ph. JM) and 7 during a 10 Oct pelagic (ph. m. obs.).

JAEGERS — HERONS

Confirmed **Pomarine** Jeager detections included: one off Virginia Beach 10 Oct (ph. SM, ph. EO, m. obs.); one off Northampton 24 Oct (ph. TP, ESB et al.); 2 off Ft. Story, Virginia Beach 9 Nov (ph. SM); one off Back Bay 18 Nov (AB, JMc); and singles off Chinc. (KBa) and Ft. Story, Virginia Beach 22 Nov (ph. SM). Birders listed Parasitic Jaegers 2 Sep through 28 Nov with a one-day high count of 12 on 20 Nov, 5 off 85th St. and 7 at Rudee (CG, AR, JW). An 8 Nov pelagic encountered 4 Black-legged Kittiwakes, one off Virginia Beach, 3 off Northampton (ph. m. obs.). A first-cycle Franklin's Gull at Chinc. 14 Nov (ph. ABs) was a Rarity Round-up weekend highlight. A BROWN NODDY photographed off Northampton at (37.031, -74.957) 9 Aug (ABs) qualified for VARCOM Category 1 consideration. If accepted, this would be the state's 2nd record for the species. Virginia's third. and first definitively photographed, YELLOW-NOSED **ALBATROSS** was off *Northampton* 8 Nov (ph.

CH, ph. AR, WT). The previous records occurred 28 Nov 1981 and 15 May 2017. Tropical Storm Isaias was responsible for the following 4 Aug **Sooty Tern** counts: one each past Cape Charles (ph. MA) and Sunset (ESB); 6 off Ft. Story, *Virginia Beach* (AB, et al.); 2 off Rudee (ph. RBi, SK); and up to 6 off Willoughby Spit, *Norfolk* (CF, KL, WT). A **Bridled Tern** was at (36.951, -74.908), *Northampton* 9 Aug (ph. LA, ph. TS,

ESB, m. obs.). Isaias also sent 2 Black Terns off Ocean View, Norfolk (ph. RBi), up to 2 off Willoughby Spit, Norfolk (CF, WT, ST) and one off the HRBT (KL). Additional sightings of this species were: 8 off Grandview 16 Aug (TBo, AR, JW); 12 at Craney 20 Aug (AM, LS, BT, BW, DY); and 3 off Ft. Monroe, *Hampton* 30 Aug (ph. JS). A video received too late for the Region's Summer 2020 report captured an ad. ROSEATE **TERN** with the tern colony on the HRBT 30 Jun (v.r. NN); one was also definitely described at Chinc. 18 Aug (ph. H&GS). A Northern Fulmar was off Northampton 8 Nov (ph. m. obs.). Two BLACK-CAPPED PETREL reports located singles off Virginia Beach at (36.81882 -75.32535) 7 Sep (JM) and off *Northampton* 10 Oct (ph. SM, m. obs.). Five Cory's Shearwaters were off *Northampton* at (37.008, -75.155) 9 Aug (ph. m. obs.) and 3 were listed for the 10 Oct pelagic (ph. SM, m. obs.). Offshore Great Shearwater totals were: 4 off Northampton 9 Aug (ph. LAn, m. obs.); singles off Virginia Beach 20 & 21 Aug and 1 Sep (ph. JM); 5 off Virginia Beach/Northampton 10 Oct (ph. SM, EO, m. obs.); one off Virginia Beach 24 Oct (ph. TP, ESB et al.); and 10 in Northampton waters 8 Nov (ph. m. obs.). One Manx Shearwater was at (36.974, -75.216), Northampton 9 Aug (ESB, m. obs.). Seventeen Audubon's Shearwaters, 2 of Virginia Beach (ph. SK, m. obs.), 15 off Northampton, were posted 9 Aug (ph. LAn, ph. TB, m. obs.); another was off Virginia Beach 21 Aug (ph. JM). The cumulative Wilson's Storm-Petrel count for a 9 Aug Virginia Beach/Northampton excursion was 323 (ESB, ph. LAn, ph. TS, m. obs.). Participants on that pelagic also recorded a WHITE-FACED STORM-PETREL at (36.982, -75.177), Northampton (ph. TB, ph. TS, m. obs.) and a meticulously described EUROPEAN STORM-**PETREL** at (36.939, -74.989), *Northampton* (ESB, GBu, DC, CF, WT). This bird will be VARCOM vetted as a Virginia first with Category 2 status. eBird shows this entry as the only one from the western Atlantic n. of North

Carolina. A **BROWN BOOBY** was perched atop red channel marker 16 off KSP 20 Aug (ph. AW, ph. ESB); a juv. landed on a vessel off *Virginia Beach* at (36.87812, -75.29529) 8 Oct (ph. JM). The state's first-ever **MASKED BOOBY** was

photographed on First Landing beach 14 Oct (ph. CJW). Despite diligent searching it was not relocated. All Anhinga reports were confined to the first half of August. These included: singles at Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 1-17 Aug (m. obs.); Chesapeake City Pk., Chesapeake 2 Aug (MA, ph. NN); L. Wright, Norfolk 6 Aug (DC); near Pioneer Rd., Suffolk and on the Blackwater R., at the Suffolk/Southampton line 8 Aug (NF); and 2 at Larkspur, Virginia Beach 16 Aug (AMy, SM). The peak reported American White Pelican count, 53 over False Cape 13 Oct (ph. DC), was interestingly coincidental with 50 at KHW the same day (KBa et al.). A first-for-the-state **GRAY HERON** was photographed at Chinc. 31 Oct (ph. JMc) then again at the NCP 9 Nov (ph. KBa). Birders had tracked what was certainly this same bird at Miners Marsh, Kings, NS, CA 28 Jun-22 Jul 2020. Before finding its way to Virginia this heron spent time at Canning, NS, CA 22 Aug and on Nantucket, MA 5 & 6 Sep. Surprisingly, it was not recorded anywhere after its Virginia sojourn. This Eurasian vagrant has been posted to eBird at irregular intervals on Bermuda from 2004 to May 2016 and more recently in Newfoundland Nov-Dec 2018. A Green Heron was at Chinc. 27 Nov (ph. BHo, JJ); after Oct is considered late for this species.

Also late was a **Yellow-crowned Night-Heron** at PHP 19 Nov (ph. JMc).

RAPTORS — PIPITS

The Kiptopeke Hawk Watch, a CVWO project since 1995, operated for a 44th consecutive fall season totaling 15,723 diurnal raptors during 749.75 hours over 88 of 92 possible count-days. Species totals may be found in the state-wide Hawk Watch Summary table located elsewhere in this journal. Up to 3 Swallow-tailed Kites were in lower Northampton 11 Aug to 1 Sep (m. obs., KBa). The KHW's 2 Golden Eagles were tallied 5 (KBa, BBr) & 23 Nov (KBa, BT), respectively. Mississippi Kites were noted at Virginia Beach locations through 15 Aug; no counts exceeded 4. Additionally, 2 were over Oak Grove L. Pk., Chesapeake 13 Aug (ph. PA), one was at Magothy Bay 15 Aug (ph. NB, TM), and an ad. was at Foxbridge, Hampton 19 Aug (BB, SB). The KHW tallied 2 on 31 Aug (BS, ph. BT), 5 on 1 Sep (KBa), and 3 on 3 Sep (KBa, BBr). Two **Broad-winged Hawks** were at the ESVNWR 11 Aug (ZP). The KHW last listed one 29 Nov (BA, KBa, ph. BT). A Swainson's Hawk, the 45th for the KHW's long-term history, passed the platform 20 Sep (ph. KBa, ph. KSp). A juv. dark morph Rough-legged Hawk made the 4 Nov KHW tally (ph. KBa, BBr). A Barn Owl passed through Cape Charles 31 Oct (ESB) and Northern Saw-whet Owl was a.r. at KSP 13 Nov (m. obs.). Tree trunks trembled as a recordsmashing 228 Red-bellied Woodpeckers flew by KSP 3 Oct (KBa et al.); the previous singlesite high count, also at KSP, was 56 on 4 Oct 2004. This was a strong passage season for Yellow-bellied Flycatchers as evidenced by: 3 at KSP 6 Sep (ESB, ph. TM); singles at Chinc. (KL, WT) and KSP (ESB) 23 Sep; Back Bay 23 (ph. SM, ph. m.obs.) & 24 Sep (K&TB); Sunset 1 Oct (GA, ESB); and the ESVNWR 5 Oct (MA, ph. NN). An Acadian Flycatcher at Sunset 2 Oct (ph. ESB) was seventeen days later than the species' 15 Sep expected late date. A carefully assessed Empidonax in Laurel Manor, Virginia Beach 12 Oct (ph. TM) proved to be an Alder Flycatcher. A Traill's (Willow/Alder) Flycatcher at Little Craney, Northampton 15 Oct (MA) was not able to be identified to species, but would be notably late for either Willow or Alder. An ASH-THROATED FLYCATCHER was at Kinder Morgan Elizabeth R. **Terminals** (restricted access), Chesapeake 24 (ph. DG) & 31 Oct (ph. DG). Another was at Craney 19 Nov (ph. BW, LS, AM, BT) and one was at Wood House Corner, Virginia Beach 28 Nov (ph. K&TB). An enigmatic, unfortunately ephemeral, Myiarchus flycatcher, at Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 20 Nov (ph. HMG) was catalogued to eBird's Fall 2020 ledger **BROWN-CRESTED** as FLYCATCHER, and, therefore. potential state first-record species. The Gold Book's Western Kingbird extreme early date (25 Aug) was reset by one at Wright's Pond, Accomack 21 Aug (GB, LF). That was followed by one at Back Bay 26 Aug (AB, CH), one at

Chinc. 1 Oct (ph. JB), and one at Craney 15 Oct (ph. DY, AM, ph. BW). Virginia's long-awaited first COUCH'S KINGBIRD was discovered at Chinc. 16 Nov (ph. BF), but not conclusively identified until 22 Nov (a. r. MA). Thenceforth, the Eastern Shore economy benefitted immensely from the m. obs. who saw and a.r. this energetic bird into Dec. The KHW's best Eastern Kingbird flight day was 859 on 31 Aug (KBa, BT). One lingered at Back Bay through 8 Oct (K&TB); 25 Sep is this species' Gold Book average late date. Single Warbling Vireos were at Mt. Trashmore Pk., Virginia Beach 27-29 Sep (m. obs.) and at Sunset (MA, ESB) and Mutton Hunk Fen, Accomack 3 Oct (SL). Virginia's second-ever BLACK-WHISKERED VIREO (one was banded at Back Bay 18 May 1991) was at KSP 15 (p. MA, ph. m. obs.) & 16 Sep (MA, CM, CH). This established an unprecedented 8th vireo species in the state during 2020. Folks visiting KSP from late September into October experienced an almost daily Blue Jay flight

unlike any seen for more than a decade. Notable high counts included: 12,744 on 2 Oct; 10,553 on 3 Oct; 9525 on 4 Oct; and 8981 on 5 Oct (KBa et al.). A Common Raven at NNP 4 Oct (MN, CS, DY) provided additional evidence of the species' incremental eastward range extension. Tardy swallow species included 2 Northern Roughwinged Swallows at KSP 1 Nov (KBa et al.), a Cliff Swallow at Sunset 9 Oct (MA, ESB) and a Barn Swallow at the ESVNWR 13 Nov (TS, ES). Documentation of the Region's Red-breasted Nuthatch incursion began with one at the ESVNWR 26 Aug (TC); the one-day high count was 77 at KSP 9 Oct (KBa et al.). A Veery at

Windsor Pt., *Norfolk* 7-10 Oct (ph. DC) was obviously unaware it was supposed to have departed by 30 Sep. A spectacular **American Robin** movement at KSP had 21,353 on 28 Oct; 23,337 on 29 Oct; 8619 on 30 Oct; and 2424 on 31 Oct (KBa et al.) Potentially an all-time high for the Region were 865 **Gray Catbirds** at Sunset 3 Oct (MA, ESB). Two **American Pipits** at Chinc. 22 Sep (TC) preceded the species' 28 Sep Gold Book extreme early date by six days.

FINCHES — DICKCISSEL

Five Evening Grosbeaks at Chincoteague Wallops Marsh 2, Accomack 2 Nov (ph. BSy) were the Region's FOS. Subsequent peak totals were 21 at KSP 8 Nov (KBa, BBr) then 20 there 17 Nov (KBa). The first reported **Purple Finches** (8) were on a vessel off Virginia Beach 8 Oct (ph. JM); 49 at KSP 5 Nov (KBa) was the most logged for a single day. Numerous Red Crossbills were encountered 9-29 Nov, all on the Eastern Shore. Counts of note were: 19 at Chinc. (NB, ph. CH, KL, PP, WT) and one at KSP 23 Nov (KBa, BT); 36 & 25 at KSP 27 (BA, KBa) & 28 Nov (KBa), respectively; and 32 at KSP (BA, KBa, ph. BT) plus 3 at Chinc. 29 Nov (AH, ph. SuS). A lone White-winged Crossbill passed the KHW 28 Nov (KBa). A Pine Siskin at KSP 21 Sep (KBa et al.), the season's first, paled numerically to 860 there 14 Oct; 844 on 18 Oct; 473 on 22 Oct; 2081 on 28 Oct; and 1362 on 5 Nov (KB et al.). Not to be out done by its congener, 3508 American Goldfinches "potato-chipped" over KSP 9 Nov (KBa, BBr). A Lapland Longspur was at Chinc. 3 Nov (ph. LG). A **Snow Bunting** at Little Cr. West Side Beach, Norfolk 1 Nov (DC) preceded 5 at Chinc. 29 Nov (EO). Precise location and time of observation data determined there were 2 Clay-colored Sparrows at Back Bay 23 Sep (AB, ph. RBi, KB). Thereafter, this sparrow was found by m. obs. throughout the Region through 26 Oct. A Vesper Sparrow was at Back Bay 3 Nov (ph. MFM). Single Lark Sparrows were at Back Bay 26 Aug (ph. AB, ph. CH), 23 Sep (ph. SM), and 28 Oct (BO, ph. RR, KSh). Other onebird reports came from: near KSP 28 & 29 Aug

(ph. ESB); ~5 km. n. of KSP 8 Sep (KBa); Chinc. 8 (ph. CJ) & 10 Sep (ph. LK); and Woodhouse Corner, Virginia Beach 22 Nov (ph. K&TB). Back Bay hosted a Lincoln's Sparrow 24 Oct (ph. RBi, ph. SM). A Swamp Sparrow at Craney 24 Sep (BW) was well ahead of the species' 10 Oct Gold Book early date. Notably early too was a White-crowned Sparrow at False Cape 26 Sep (AD, TT). The season's last Bobolink was reported from the KHW 14 Nov (KBa). Among KHW's exceptional posts was 362 Baltimore Orioles there 23 Sep (KBa), a count that greatly surpassed 226 recorded at that site 31 Aug 1989. An **Ovenbird** at KSP 17 Nov (ph. SM) was more than a month past the species' 15 Oct average late date. Known to be an early migrant, a singing Louisiana Waterthrush was at Savage Neck Dunes NAP, Northampton 6 Aug (m. obs.). A Northern Waterthrush at Back Bay 24 Oct (ph. RBi, JSc) was two weeks beyond the species' 10 Oct average late date. A Golden-winged Warbler was at the ESVNWR 7 Oct (MP, ph. MA, ESB, DN). A Prothonotary Warbler at Mt. Trashmore Pk., Virginia Beach 27 Sep (ph. RR) was twelve days past the species' normal late date and a Nashville Warbler at Simkins Rd., Northampton 8 Nov (MP) had stretched its stay

beyond the species' 15 Oct average last occurrence. Virginia's first **VIRGINIA'S WARBLER** discovered at the end of Virginia Ave., in *Virginia Beach*'s Marsh View Pk. was a remarkably serendipitous 9 Oct encounter (ph. SK). The bird was noticed when it flew from the edge of a parking lot to a small tree where it sat

long enough to be definitively photographed. Efforts to find that prize over following days were unsuccessful. Single Connecticut Warblers at KSP 15 (TD) & 19 Sep (ESB) were followed by one to 2 at Indian River Pk., Chesapeake 23 Sep (2) and 2 Oct (one) (ph. DG) and one at the ESVNWR 6 Oct (MA). A f. Hooded Warbler at Marsh View Pk., Virginia Beach 12 Oct (ph. ESB) tied the species Gold Book extreme late date. A Cape May Warbler was at Savage Neck 14 Nov (MA, RBi, TD, IT) and a Northern Parula was at KSP 15 Nov (KBa, BBr). Onehundred fifteen American Redstarts were tallied in lower Northampton 5 Sep, 91 at Sunset (ph. RBi, ESB) plus 24 at KSP (KBa et al.); one each were at False Cape (JMc) and Stumpy L., Virginia Beach (DC) 27 Oct. A stunning TOWNSEND'S WARBLER was at Mt. Trashmore Pk., Virginia Beach 26 (MA) & 27 (ph. m. obs.) Sep. Likely this was the same one in Kempsville, Virginia Beach, ~ 3 km from Mt. Trashmore Pk., 27 Nov to 10 Dec (ph. UD). That individual constituted the state's 5th or 6th record, only 3 of which have been VARCOM Accepted (VA) as follows: one at KSP 2 Dec 1999 (DC) then another, or the same, at nearby Devil's Ditch, Northampton 31 Dec 1999 through 12 Jan

2000 (VA); one on the College of William & Mary campus, *Williamsburg* 8 Oct 2004 (DCr) (VA); one at KSP 22 Oct 2011 (ESB); and one at New Quarter Pk., *York* 26 Dec 2015 (BW et al.) (VA). The same Kempsville residence noted above also welcomed a **Yellow-throated Warbler** 27 Nov into the winter period (ph. UD); one has wintered at this location the previous two

years. Extending this species' trend in recent years, an imm. m. Western Tanager was at Marsh View Pk., Virginia Beach 12 Oct (ph. MA, AB, ESB, DC, CFa) and an ad. m. was near Chic's Beach, Virginia Beach 22 Nov (ph. KS). A Rose-breasted Grosbeak at Simpkins Railroad, Northampton 26 Nov (MP, ph. MiP) far exceeded the species' 10 Oct normal late date. An Indigo Bunting was at Back Bay 4 Nov (ph. JMc); post 25 Oct is late for this species. **Painted** Bunting observations included: a f. at Laurel Manor, Virginia Beach 5 Oct to 25 Nov (ph. TM); a m. at Porter Rd., Portsmouth 13 Oct (GH); a f. at Burton Station Rd., Virginia Beach 5 Nov (ph. AB); a f. at the Harris Teeter Retention Pond, off Princess Anne Rd., Virginia Beach 19 Nov (ph. SM, K&TB); a m. at Oceana Gardens East, Virginia Beach 20 Nov (ph. JMc), and a f. in Norfolk's Norfolk Garden section 22 Nov (LRa). There were thirteen **Dickcissel** reports, all of single birds, ten from lower Northampton 5 Sep (RBi, ESB) through 14 Nov (KBa) and three from Virginia Beach 24 Sep to 6 Nov (ph. TM).

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
